

Greetings from your pastor and partner in ministry!!

I must say, the rumor is true...the fall colors up here are simply amazing! My family and I came up here last fall after the leaves had fallen and just before that horrendous Thanksgiving blizzard, so we didn't have an opportunity to witness the reputed colors of the Northwoods. But what an awesome display of colors! What an awesome God who created such wondrous things for us to enjoy! As beautiful as the leaves are, we know they won't last long on the trees and before long we'll slide into the barren winter landscape. For many, the colorful leaves represent a time of change. They remind us that we live in a world that is always changing; sometimes for the worse and sometimes for the better. Change is inevitable in this world and we need to embrace the beauty of it rather than fixate on the uncertainty of it.

Heaven knows we've been in a season of change for quite some time now, both societally and congregationally. Amidst all the unrest caused by the coronavirus, racial tensions, environmental disasters, and political upheaval, we've succeeded in getting a shared ministry started together. That said, I'd like to make one more change this month. I'd like to revive a mentor program for our confirmation students in which I pair up a confirmed member with one or two of our confirmands. I'm asking that mentors and mentees simply meet once a month, either in-person or online, to connect and discuss faith matters. I'll even provide discussion questions to help generate conversation. How hard is that?! But I still need volunteers to help serve as mentors so please consider it and get back to me asap. This is a great opportunity for our young ones to connect with those of a more mature faith.

But even with the inspiration of others, it's understandable that we sometimes think the world's problems are so big that we can do little to help. On our own, we cannot end wars or wipe out injustice, but cumulative impact of thousands of small acts of goodness can be bigger than we imagine " spoken by Queen Elizabeth II in her Christmas message 2016

These words inspired me to think about the beautiful acts of goodness by members of our congregation. Our community is in need. Food collections for Thanksgiving baskets have begun for families in need. Each week a new item is requested, but any non perishable food item would be accepted. Mission and Outreach board delivers these donated food items to the area collection spot.

The coat, snow pant and boot give away sponsored by the Mission and Outreach board is going to be Oct 11 from 2 to 4pm. Thrivent gift cards have been donated by 3 members to buy these items. A member also donated 9 pairs of new boots. Additional donations would also helpful. Hats, gloves and mittens are also needed. Safety protocols for distribution have been put in place.

The Board of Education has worked very hard on developing safety protocols for our students. Each student has their own box of supplies. These supplies include scissors, markers, pencils etc. These are touched only by that student. Many of these supplies have been purchased by their teachers. Every Monday the SS classrooms used are cleaned thoroughly by the custodian. Our SS starts at 9:30 the same time as church. They check in like church members and get their temperature checked and sign in. After SS they exit out the courtyard doors. Safety first.

Our Trustee board is very busy keeping our grounds safe. They keep working on various building repair projects. They are a talented bunch. Pouring cement, replacing needed shingles and repairing gutters. Supplies are often donated by the board members. Gene Rosburg is on "speed dial" as he is their "go to guy".

The Stewardship drive will begin in November. Another challenge for us during the pandemic. The drive is important for our church to continue to do small acts of goodness for our community and keeping the church finances in order. Please prayerfully consider a pledge.

The Deacon Board continues to pray for each member of the congregation. Our communion supplies for live stream video services are available for you to pickup in a basket outside the office. Isn't it wonderful you can watch services from home? Who would of thought how important this would be to our congregation this year?

Wow what a great bunch of members! Keep up with your own small acts of goodness. Together we can make a difference. God bless each of you.

Education Corner

Confirmation—

A new year of confirmation classes began on Wednesday, September 23rd at 2:30 pm. The plan is to meet in the church but this could change with the status of the pandemic. On September 16th Pastor met with continuing and new students and their parents to define clear expectations for the year. At this point, confirmation classes will only be for OSLC students. Confirmation took place for 5 students on September 13th. (10 were confirmed last spring). Those confirmed were Bryson Jessup, Ava Rue, Ryah Samarzia, Nora Wells and Sam Willie. The weather cooperated and we were able to have a well attended outdoor service.

Pastor would like to have a mentorship program this year and is looking for volunteers. This would mean meeting one on one with a confirmation student once each month from October to April. He has some volunteers but more are needed.

Sunday School-

Sunday School began on September 20th with 15 students attending along with 4 teachers. We are trying to do this as safely as possible. The children and anyone accompanying them are to come in the front door and have their temperature taken. They then immediately go downstairs and directly to their classrooms. They wear masks throughout the time they are in the church. Per directives, there is no singing. They were given individual supply boxes and are not to share the contents. The boxes will remain in the classroom. Any other supplies will be distributed by the teacher. None of this was a problem for the kids or their parents. .

First communion-Tyler Dahl and Samantha Koos also celebrated their First Communion at the outdoor service on September 13th.

7. Is it easy or hard for you not to misuse God’s name?
8. Why is it important to not misuse God’s name?
9. When you hear others misuse God’s name, what is your reaction? Is it the right reaction?
10. How do you keep the Sabbath holy?
11. Why is it important to keep the Sabbath holy?
12. Who benefits most from keeping the Sabbath holy?
13. For the most part, do you find it easy or hard to honor BOTH your parents? Why?
14. Why is it important to honor BOTH parents?
15. Is it easier to honor one parent more than the other? Why?
16. Why do you think people murder each other?
17. Can murder ever be justifiable? Why or why not?
18. Why is it important not to murder?
19. Which of the first 5 commandments is easiest/hardest for you to honor?
20. Do you think your eternal soul is affected by whether you honor the commandments or not?






2 students received their First Communion and 5 students were confirmed on September 13.

10-07-20 Exodus 32:1-14

1. What was the situation which gave rise to the people making the golden calf?
2. What do you think of the people's request? What is the purpose and intention behind it? What did this show about the heart of the people?
3. Why do you think they did this when Moses was gone, but not when he was there? What does this show about their relationship to God? How about us? When will our true character come out?
4. How might the Israelite's actions mirror our own interactions with God?
5. What do you think of God's reaction? Was he justified in what he threatens to do?
6. Did they completely abandon worship of the true God? What does this tell us about how Satan works? How about the process of turning away from God?
7. What words would you use to describe Moses here? What reasons did He give that God should spare the people? Were these reasonable? What can we learn about Moses' character here?
8. Why do you think Moses felt freedom to speak so boldly to God? Was God angry with Moses for speaking out? What does the fact that God didn't rebuke Moses (but listened to him) show about Moses' correctness in speaking this way?
9. What does verse 14 mean that God "changed His mind." Does this mean God didn't know everything about the future or made a mistake? Why did God say this to begin with?
10. Do you regularly intercede for others or do you focus on your own needs? If you tell others you will pray for them, do you? Do you pray for them once and then stop?

1. What impression do we have of Hannah? Why?
2. What impression do we have of Eli? Why? In particular – would we describe Eli as observant or "noticing," or not? Why?
3. What stands out to you about the details of Hannah's prayer?
4. What attributes of God does she specifically mention? What did Hannah intend for her son by her vow? What does this reveal about her?
5. Why is it significant that Hannah surrendered her future child to lifetime service to God? As a parent, what sacrifices would this require of her? Why would it be worth it?
6. Hannah asked God to look upon her sorrow, and He did. What does it mean to you that the Creator of the universe cares about you enough to answer your prayers?
7. What do you find most difficult about letting go and relying on God through prayer?
8. One of the major themes of the Bible that we see in chapter 2 is the great reversal of fortunes:

"God opposes the proud, but gives grace to the humble." What are some specific ways we see this theme in Hannah's song?

9. How did Hannah express her gratitude to God for her child? In what practical ways can we express our gratitude to God?

10. How does Hannah describe her own condition following God's blessing? What are some of the attributes of God that Hannah mentions in her song?

10-21-20 2 Samuel 7:1-17

1. Why do you think David wanted to build a house for the LORD?
2. Why do you think the LORD did not want David to build him a house?
3. What does the LORD want David to understand about their relationship?
4. What does God mean when he says to David, "the LORD will make you a house"?
5. What does God promise David?
6. Are these promises conditional, unconditional or both? (see also 1 Kings 2:4, 8:25, 11:11-13) What conditions (if any) does God require for these promises to be fulfilled?
7. What do the prophets say about the King that will reign on David's throne forever? (see Ezekiel 27:23-24; Jeremiah 23:5-6; Isaiah 9:6-7)
8. How does God meet the conditions and fulfill His promise that the "Forever King" would be both righteous (sinless) and a descendent of David? (see Luke 1:31-33)
9. What does this passage teach us about "doing things for the Lord?" (see also Psalm 127:1) When we do accomplish something for the LORD who should get the glory? Why?
10. As a subject of God's Forever Kingdom, what are your responsibilities to your King? What is the mission he has given to his subjects (the Church) and how are you a part of that mission? (see Matthew 28:18-20; Acts 1:8; 2 Corinthians 5:20)

10-28-20 1 Kings 17:1-24

1. What was unusual about the ways God chose to provide for Elijah during the drought?
2. Elijah receives an instruction from God to go to Zarephath – a long way away (v8). The widow receives an instruction from God, via Elijah, to give Elijah water and bread – before she feeds herself and her son (v13). How difficult do these instructions sound to us? Why is that?
3. If we ourselves were in Elijah's position, or the widow's position, do we see ourselves behaving as they did? Why is that?
4. The woman in the story is a widow, and her son technically an orphan; these are categories of people who are supposed to be protected according to Torah. What difference does this make to the way we understand this story?
5. Elijah is a prophet of YHWH – also a category of person who has a special relationship with the God of Israel. What difference does this make to the way we understand this story?
6. The woman in the story identifies God as "your" (Elijah's) God. Does this suggest that she does, or does not, think of God as also "her" God?
7. The widow said to Elijah, "The word of the Lord comes truly from your mouth." Can you say this of any people you know? What is it about them that would allow you to make that judgment?

- Cotton or cotton-poly blend fabric from drapes, shower curtains, bedspreads, etc.



Our Saviors Lutheran Church Superior Council Minutes

September 15th, 2020

Meeting called to order by President Kathy Nelson at 5:35 pm

Present: Pastor Koos, Jack Arthur, Carol Arthur, Kathy Nelson, Andy Nelson, Doris Maki, Bonnie Wentzel, Julianne Koski, Steve Shaw, Stephanie Shaw, Carol Skamser, and Kandee Rosburg

The meeting was opened with all reciting the Mission Statement. Pastor gave a devotion and lead us in prayer.

Secretary's Report: A motion was made, seconded, and unanimously pass to approve the August Council minutes.

Treasurer's Report: Bonnie reported that August income was \$10,568.57 and expenses were \$12,727.48. We will be able to make the October mortgage payment. This month we will have the insurance bill due. A motion was made, seconded, and unanimously pass to approve the Treasurer's report.

Board Reports:

Deacons: Carol S. reported that they thanked Steve Shaw for donating the thermometer. They encouraged each Deacon to send out a few cards each month to members. They are starting to think about future services and what they can do.

Trustees: Jack reported that the sign, "We Are Open for Services" that Linda Clark's son donated is back up. Northland Safety checked all the fire extinguishers. The kitchen hood needs to be cleaned at least once a year for our insurance, but the dilemma is that the hood isn't being used, so why should we clean it? The Firer Marshall won't give us anything in writing. The north west corner wall was leaking, so concrete was poured there in the flowerbed to direct water away. The wall below was caulked, and a hole was fixed in the pipe. St. Paul window still needs water test so nothing has been done there. Flashing/trim piece that came off was put back on the east side of the church.

Mission & Outreach: Carol A. reported that they have three Thrivent cards to help with the coat, hat, mitten, and boots give-away. A church member donated 9 pair the snow boots. The day of the give-away, people will stay in their cars and be given a number. Helpers will go into the church and get what they need. Kids will be given a pre-packaged drink and snack. The clothes closet will be open to one family at a time.

Stewardship: Doris reported that they did the drawing for the Bunco prizes and that \$425 was made on it. They are looking at a "NO Bake Bake-Sale". Also, a movie night. The Stewardship pledge drive will start in October. Stewardship is going to watch a presentation on "10 reasons why people won't give to the church".

Education: Julianne reported that they discussed Confirmation and First Communion which took place this past Sunday. Sunday School will start this Sunday. They have 15 students that plan to attend. Parents were sent a safety protocol letter. The same teachers will be teaching. Sunday School will start at 9:30 a.m. The students will enter through the church main door and have a temperature check. They will go down the

center steps to their classroom. They will be dismissed at 10:15 am and exit through the center step doors. For Confirmation they want to purchase workbooks using the Kronlund fund.

A motion was made, seconded, and unanimously pass to approve board minutes.

Pastor's Report

Confirmation will start September 16th will parents at the orientation. Classes will begin September 23rd, starting at 1:30 pm on Wednesdays, and end May 5th. On May 9th this year's class will be confirmed. The program for confirmation will be one year of study on the bible and the other year of study on the catechism. There will be 6 unit tests each year with 60% as a passing grade and they can take it until they pass. Pastor needs 11 volunteer mentors for the mentor part of the program. They will meet once a month with their student and Pastor will have discussion questions. For sermon notes, Pastor will have special questions ready each week.
