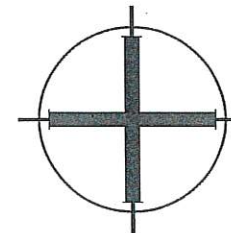

It's spring. The grass is getting greener and the trees are budding. A symbol of rebirth and a symbol of **hope**. Hope that this year will be much better than last year. Vaccinations are increasing and cases of CoVid19 are decreasing. However the pandemic is far from over. The number of cases in the U.S. ,while decreasing is still far too high and actually starting to increase again in some places. Even here in Douglas County, there were 158 confirmed cases of CoVid19 from April 12th to 25th; thankfully with no deaths. Vaccines are now available to anyone over age 16 who wants one, at no charge. There are multiple sites in Superior and the Twin Ports to get one.

The CDC has now changed some of their recommendations. Anyone who has been vaccinated can gather in small groups outside without a mask. You still should always wear a mask indoors and in large groups outdoors.

So for now, we will continue our safety guidelines here at the church.

Please consider donating to help the church replace its inefficient boiler. The Synod assembly of the NW synod met via zoom on April 15th and April 17th. This was a new and exciting way to meet and it went extremely well. The zoom process was organized and voting went amazingly fast. Pastor Sean, Kandee Rosburg and I met with 333 other synod voting members all in the comfort of our own home. This synod assembly theme was on track with the current events we are experiencing as a nation. The statements for the assembly that kept our focus. These 3 main statements were: A. "when justice is done it is joy to the righteous". Proverbs 21:5 B. Justice is what Love looks like in public C. Martin Luther said "God does not need your good work your neighbor does" Resolutions were passed to create a church that shows Justice. These resolutions include Gender Equality, Hunger, Racial Justice, LGBTQIA and Creative care We will be getting information and training on these resolutions and start conversations regarding being a RIC congregation (Reconciling in Christ) I enjoyed this assembly and I felt very encouraged that our church will be moving forward along with all the other NW synod congregations to become Justice inclusive church. Confirmation— The last day of confirmation classes is Wednesday May 5th. The confirmation service for this year's graduates will be May 9th at the 9:30 a.m. service.

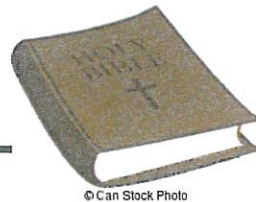
Sunday School—The last day of Sunday School is May 16th.

Bottom line : It's an easy way to do your shopping, help yourself stay healthy and help the church.

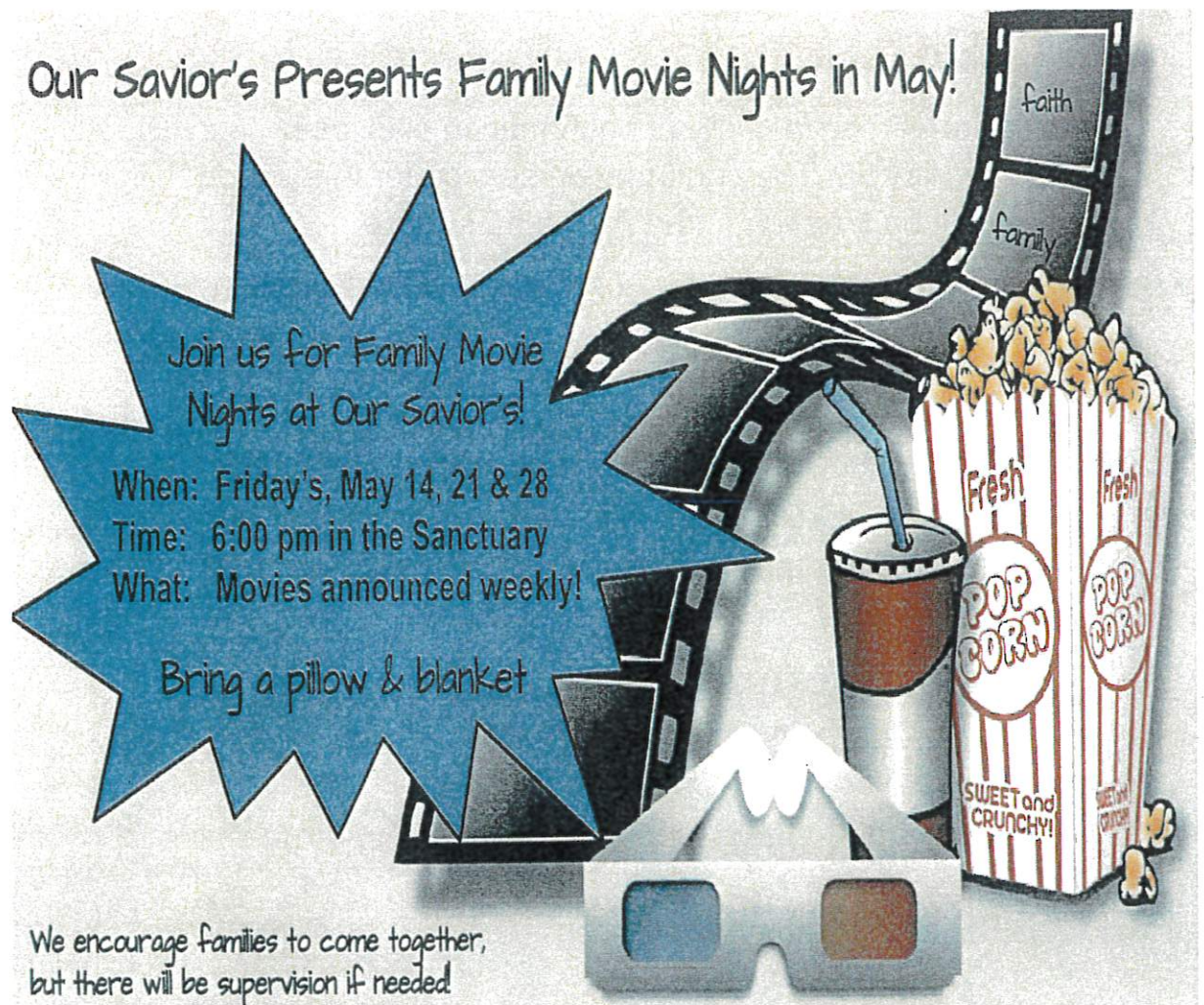

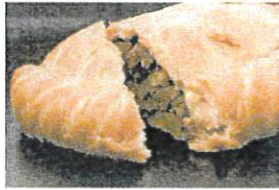

We will be selling hanging baskets again. They will sell for \$35. You can purchase a voucher at the church office. Then you can take the voucher to Lilac Hill pick out your own basket. The baskets were very nice last year. Watch for an email with the dates.



Do you have ideas for other fundraisers? Talk to a member of the Board of Stewardship, Pastor or the office!

Our upcoming major expense is the replacement of our aging boilers. Thanks to Rick Gilbertson, they have made it through this winter but they may not make it through another. The Council has decided to take action now. 2021 is also the last year the church would be able to get an energy efficiency rebate. A new boiler also means the probability of a substantial reduction in heating bills. Quotes of \$46,000 to \$55,000 have been received. We hope to have the boilers replaced this summer. We are applying for an energy efficiency grant for \$2500.00 and are looking for other grants to assist in paying for the boilers. A fund has been set up to raise money to cover the additional cost. Any donation large or small is appreciated. We are also looking at a number of fundraisers. At this point we have raised \$12,815.00. We will keep you informed of the amount raised as we go forward.

Our Saviors Lutheran Church Superior Council Minutes April 20th, 2021

The meeting called to order by Kathy Nelson at 5:33 pm

Present: Pastor Koos, Jack Arthur, Carol Arthur, Doris Maki, Andy Nelson, Kathy Nelson, Bonnie Wentzel, Julianne Koski, Carol Skamser, Steve Shaw, Stephanie Shaw, and Kande Rosburg

The meeting was opened by Kathy reporting on the Synod Assembly. Pastor Koos, Kande, and Kathy attend the April 15th and 17th meetings by zoom. **"Justice and Joy"** was the theme, taken from Proverbs 21:15, "When justice is done it is a joy to the righteous." We approved: the budget, minimum standards for compensation and benefits for specific staff, cleaned up some wording in the synod constitution, recognition of the new ministry of Milltown Lutheran Church (two churches combined to make a new one), resolution in Support of ELCA Hunger Ministry, resolution on gender equality in the synod, resolution on education and resources on LGBTQIA+ conversation, resolution in support of racial justice training, and resolution in support of creation care (environmental). The congregation will be hearing more about these resolutions in the future.

Secretary's Report: A motion was made, seconded, and unanimously pass to approve the March Council minutes.

Treasurer's Report: Bonnie reported that March income was \$9,684.75 and expenses were \$11,671.32. Utilities were high because of February's bill. A motion was made, seconded, and unanimously pass to approve the Treasurer's report.

Board Reports:

Deacons: Carol S. reported that they didn't have a meeting, but they have talked about maybe starting readers again next month. In May, the covid-19 number of people allowed in the building may change. Right now, it is at 50.

Trustees: Jack reported that the roof is pretty much done. They seemed to have done a good job with the cleanup. The lawn on the north side is rutted up, Empire will fix it. There are some shingles on the northwest corner that are up some, they will fix those. It was mentioned that they hadn't put flashing on the whole chimney. Our cost for the project seems to be about \$97,000 because we choose the better shingles. Insurance is covering over \$91,000 and we have a grant that will cover the remaining \$6,686. We have two companies that have given us bids for the boiler. Belknap Plumbing at \$55,000. Stack Brothers gave us three options in their bids. Their bid options all would include boiler/s and asbestos removed. \$36,000 replaces the oldest boiler and two would be left. The next two bids would also include tying the plumbing together above the boilers so that the boilers would run one at a time and add the other ones as needed. \$46,000 would be two boilers at 85% efficiency. And \$56,000 would be one boiler with 95% efficiency.

Still waiting to hear what those efficiencies would mean to our utility bills. Trustees are still working on the leaky windows in the St. Paul room and boiler room. Now that the roof is done, they are going to add an eave to the northeast corner to keep water out of the basement. They are also looking at SWLP doing an energy audit of the church. The council let the Trustees know that they are doing a "Good Job!"

Mission & Outreach: Carol A. reported that they selected who they were donating to in May and June. 30 quilts were blessed and delivered to Faith United Methodist Church.

Stewardship: Doris reported that pasties and scone sales made \$1,185 towards the boiler. They will be selling the hanging baskets again for \$35. Half-year annual reports are due May 12th.

Education: Julianne reported that the confirmation retreat is this weekend. Pastor, Carina Barker and Jason Westlund will be chaperoning. They will be working on their stoles for confirmation. They had talked about having confirmation outdoors on May 9th, but council made a motion and second to do it indoors with people making reservations to attend. Confirmation family guests would have priority. Motion was approved.

A motion was made, seconded, and unanimously pass to approve board minutes.

Pastor Koos Report: Pastor reported:

6 students will be attending Camp Amnicon Retreat. The students are paying \$20.

The radio broadcasting with the other churches isn't going to happen. No other interest.

The last two Sunday services have been livestreamed on Facebook and also YouTube. You may have noticed the picture freeze and jump. Since there have been very few views on YouTube and the quality of picture, isn't as good we will just go back to only livestreaming on Facebook (which includes the church website).

Up coming funerals: Alex Kotter May 8th, Scott Schachte May 15th, and Al Will June 4th.

Old Business:

No one has shown an interest in using the cabins at Camp Amnicon this weekend

Roof cost for the congregation \$6,686

Boiler donations are slowing coming in. Stewardship is going to write a letter to members.

New Business: Need to write a grant for the boiler to Minnesota Power. Pastor will check to see if the synod offers grants for that.

Annual meeting will be June 6th. Decided to have in-person and use zoom. Will have a signup sheet ahead to make sure we have 50 for attendance.


Discussed funerals and serving food. Can do it, but need to follow guidelines for serving and social distancing.

Discussed coffee hour and decided to wait at least until after the summer.
