08-04-21 Revelation 4:1-11

- 1. In v1 the author sees a door standing open in heaven. If we saw something like that, how would we feel e.g., curious, frightened, excited, other and why?
- 2. The physical description of "the one sitting on the throne" seems to emphasize brilliance. What does this brilliance say about God to us? Why? Why does the author not mention the size of the throne or the one sitting on it, do we think?
- 3. The 24 elders are generally thought to represent the twelve tribes of Israel and the 12 apostles. What might it signify, that representatives of Israel and the early church are engaged in eternal, heavenly worship of God? What implications does this have for us? Why?
- 4. What words would we use to describe the heavenly scene in this text (e.g., awesome, frightening, dream-like, ...)? Why? What difference does it make how we describe the scene?
- 5. The heavenly liturgy calls God the "ruler of everything," and emphasizes God's glory, honor, and power. How is this vision of God similar to the way you most often think about God, how is it different?
- 6. How is John's vision of heaven similar to the vision(s) of heaven familiar to us from popular culture? How is it similar to the images you most often have of heaven? How is it different from those?
- 7. What difference does this vision of heaven make for our thoughts about heaven? Why?
- 8. Does John's vision of heaven have a purpose, do we think that is, is there some reason we need to know what John saw? What is it, do we think?
- 9. What does the throne symbolize in Revelation? How does it help you to know that God is ultimately in control of human history?
- 10. How can God be worshipped so passionately in heaven (Revelation 4) when there is so much struggle within the church on earth (Revelation 2-3)?

08-11-21 Revelation 5:1-13

- 1. Look ahead into chapter 6 enough to get a feel for the content of this scroll. What does "being worthy" have to do with being able to open this scroll?
- 2. What happens when the seals are broken? What is it about Jesus that makes Him worthy to open the scroll? Consider John 8:7.

- 3. Why does John weep in verse 4? Why does the lack of a worthy person produce such grief?
- 4. How did Jesus overcome or triumph in a way that makes Him worthy to open this scroll?
- 5. Who is speaking in verse 5? See Isaiah 11:1-10 for Root, and Genesis 49:9. What is Jacob prophesying about Judah? How was that fulfilled? Why are these titles -- "Lion of Judah, Root of David" -- important?
- 6. When John looks at the beginning of verse 6, what does he expect to see? What does he see? What is the purpose of this surprise?
- 7. Identify three characteristics of the lamb that John notes, and explain why each is important.
- 8. In verse 8, why do the elders and creatures fall down before the lamb? What is the implication of this action?
- 9. Compare the songs sung to the Lamb in verses 9, 10, 12, and 13 to the praise spoken to God the Father in 4:8 and 4:11. How are they similar? How are they different?
- 10. Compare verses 13 and 11 with verse 3. To whom was the angel with the loud voice speaking in verse 3? What is their eventual reaction?

08-18-21 Revelation 6:1-8, 7:9-17

- 1. If a non-Christian asked you "How could you believe in a God who allows suffering even of His own people?" How would you answer them?
- 2. The opening of the seals represents the unfolding events of history during the age of the church. Why is it significant that "the Lamb" is the one opening the seals?
- 3. What do each of the 4 horsemen bring with them? What is the progressive pattern in the first 4 seals that is repeated throughout history? Read Matt. 24:4-14, 23-31. Similarities/differences?
- 4. In 6:8 John declares that "they [the four horsemen] were given power" to kill. Who gave them that power and why?
- 5. Read Joel 2:28 to 3:21. Are these sections talking about the same event? Now read Acts 2:14-21.
- 6. Compare Rev. 5:1-6 with 7:1-10. How does the former help you understand the latter?
- 7. What is the significance of this group "standing before the throne and before the Lamb?"
- 8. Compare the worship in 7:12 with the same group's worship in 5:12. What similarities do you notice? What differences? Are the differences significant, and if so, significant of what?
- 9. Why do you think the elder asks John these 2 questions in v. 13?
- 10. What is the source of the tears that will be wiped away? Are they from sorrow (i.e. over sin)? From suffering?

8-25-21 Revelation 13:1-18

- 1. Where does the first beast come from? The second beast? In light of 10:1-2, what can we say about the ability of these beasts to disrupt God's plan?
- 2. Consider the first beast. Look at Rev 12:3 and Gen. 3:14-15 as well as Dan. 7, especially verses 1-7, 17, 18, and 23-27. List the characteristics of this beast. What similarities are there between the beasts in Dan. 7 and this beast? What do the beasts in Dan. 7 represent? What, then, might this beast represent?
- 3. Who worships the first beast? Why? What is the relationship between the beast and the dragon?
- 4. What does this beast say? What does he do? What impact does this have on the saints? How can you tell that God is in control, even now?
- 5. Reflect on verse 10, and how it would speak to Christians through the ages.
- 6. Detail the characteristics of the second beast. What does it mean for the beast to look like a lamb, but to speak like a dragon? What other lambs appear in Revelation? What does this beast represent?
- 7. What is the relationship between the two beasts? Given your interpretation of the beasts, how do you understand this relationship?
- 8. The beast requires its subjects to get a mark on their foreheads or right hands. Look again at Rev 7:2-3. What do people have to choose between? What are the only two options? What are the consequences of refusing the sign of the beast? What are the implications for us today?
- 9. Look at verse 18 carefully. How is 7 used in Scripture, particularly in Revelation? How is 3 used? Why might 666 be an appropriate number for the beast, for man's number?
- 10. What tactic does the beast use to separate unbelievers from true believers? What tactics are used today to pull us away from worship of the one true God?

Sister Tooti's Blue Cheese Dressing

(Linda Clark)

1 quart Helman Mayonaisse

4 cups sour cream

12 ounces of more Blu Cheese

1/2 heaping teaspoon garlic powder

1 teaspoon (scant) or to taste

1 ounce (2 Tablespoons) lemon juice

1/2 medium onion, grated

Dash red pepper



Southwest Pork Chop Foil Packs

1 can black beans, drained & rinsed

1 1/2 cups frozen corn, thawed

1/2 cup salsa

2 tsp. chili powder

1 tsp. ground cumin

4 boneless pork chops 3/4—1 inch thick

Bring in books you have already read and exchange them for another. There are also books on CD available. The cart is located in the basement at the bottom of the steps from the middle doors.


Puzzle Corner

New Boiler

The trustees recommend we accept a bid of \$55,000 from Belknap Plumbing for the new boiler. This does require approval by the congregation. A congregational meeting has been scheduled for August 8th after the service. A quorum of 50 in house/virtual members is required. If you plan to attend virtually, please let the office know.

The boiler fund continues to raise money to cover the cost. Any donation large or small is appreciated. While the donations have reached \$49,435, there is still some to go. We would like to get the boiler installed this summer. Any donation large or small is appreciated. We will continue to keep you informed of the amount raised as we go forward. Look for the thermometer in the St. Paul's Room.

Challenge to Donate

A challenge has been given to congregation members to make a donation to the boiler fund between now and the congregational meeting on August 8th. For every dollar donated, it will be matched dollar for dollar up to \$500.00. That means if 10 people donate \$50.00 or even if 20 people donate \$25.00, the boiler fund will get \$1000.00. If you haven't made a donation already, this may be the time to do so.
