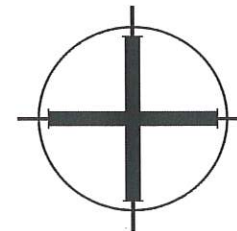

Psalm 137:4 *How can we sing the Lord's song in a foreign land?*

Luke 1:46-49 And Mary said, "My soul magnifies the Lord, and my spirit rejoices in God my Savior, for he has looked with favor on the lowliness of his servant. Surely, from now on all generations will call me blessed; for the Mighty One has done great things for me, and holy is his name.

Christmas Message to the Northwest Synod of Wisconsin

In 1926, my maternal grandmother left Germany and immigrated to the United States. One of my earliest memories is singing *Silent Night (Stille Nacht)* in German by the Christmas tree in her small house in Jackson, MN. I wonder what it was like for her to move to a foreign land not speaking the language. I wonder how difficult it must have been for her to sing her song in a foreign land.

Last Christmas most of us couldn't gather inside our church buildings to sing *Silent Night* on Christmas Eve. Some of us sang to our computer screens, some sang in their cars in the parking lot, some sang with masks. We were all trying to sing the Lord's song in a foreign land, the land of COVID. It has been difficult. Our song has been muted.

Psalm 137 is a lament Psalm. The writer of Psalm 137 is describing the pain of the people who were forced to live in a foreign land after witnessing the destruction of their homeland and their temple. They are grieving the losses, lamenting, crying, and finding it impossible to "sing the Lord's song in a foreign land."

My heart goes out to the Afghan Refugees, who are experiencing their first winter at Fort McCoy. I wonder how difficult it will be for them to sing their songs of faith in a foreign land. Many know that they will never go home again.

In Luke 1 Mary sings her song in unknown territory. She has received the message from Gabriel that she will bear God's son and his name is to be Jesus, and he will reign as king forever. This incomprehensible message is confirmed by her relative Elizabeth and changes Mary's life's circumstances. Mary is asked to do what no one has ever done before. This is uncharted and foreign territory for a young girl. She sings her song in a foreign land like her sisters before her Miriam, Ruth, and Hannah. She sings a song of courage, faith, hope, and love.

This Advent/Christmas/Epiphany season I invite you to reflect on Mary's song as an old song sung in new circumstances. Many of us and our churches find ourselves dealing with circumstances we might not have chosen for ourselves and wish were different, circumstances that might cause us to lament and grieve. We are here now. Sing. Join Mary and the faithful of every time and place, that great cloud of witnesses, and sing of courage, faith, hope, and love. Sing. Sing an old song of trust in unfamiliar territory, and sing a new song of hope in a new land. We are here now.

May the Hope of Advent, Joy of Christmas and Light of Epiphany bring you Peace. Bishop Laurie



The advent wreath is a beautiful and symbolic decoration meant to prepare us for Christmas.

It is circular meaning God has no beginning and no end and is adorned with evergreens which are green all year round symbolizing life everlasting. There are 4 candles, one for each week of advent.

1 : Lighting the first candle which is purple begins the week of hope. It is called the **Prophecy Candle** to remind us of the prophets who foretold the birth of Jesus.

2: Lighting the second candle which is also purple begins the week of peace. It is called the **Bethlehem Candle** as a reminder of Mary and Joseph's journey to Bethlehem.

3: Lighting the third candle which is pink begins the week of joy. It is called the **Shepherd's Candle** to remind us of the joy the world experiences with the birth of Jesus.

4: Lighting the fourth candle which again is purple begins the week of love. It is called the **Angel's Candle** and symbolizes peace. It reminds us of the message of the angels: "Peace on Earth, Good Will Toward Men".

5: A fifth candle is added to the center and lit on Christmas Eve. It is called the **Christ Candle** and represents the life of Christ. It is white for purity because Christ is our sinless, pure Savior.

A Message from Mission and Outreach

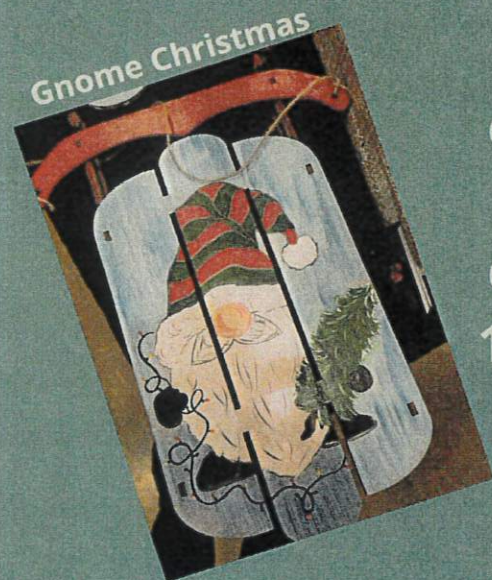

12-01-21 Ezekiel 37:1-14

1. Why would God give Ezekiel a vision of a valley of dry human bones? What do these bones represent?
2. In v3, God asks Ezekiel if these bones can live. What is God trying to teach Ezekiel through this vision?
3. Ezekiel then responds. Does he learn anything? What does he learn?
4. Ezekiel was to preach to those in exile describing in detail the revival of these bones (flesh and breath restored). How might this give hope to those in exile?
5. V. 6, what is God's stated reason that He will restore those in Exile? Why is this important?
6. What is the significance of breaking this reanimation of life into two stages? (Hint: Word and Spirit)
7. How can we be more open to the Spirit in our lives, especially when sharing our faith?
8. God interprets the vision for Ezekiel: The exiled nation of Israel has lost all hope and God will restore this hope. What are the three parts of his hope and why is each one important?
9. What does the reanimation sequence indicate to us about how God works?

5. What attribute(s) of God do vv. 8-9 describe?
6. What is the word of God likened to in vv. 10-11 and what does this tell us about the word of God?
7. What is pictured as the ultimate achievement of God's word in vv. 12-13?
8. Read John 6:27, 35, 40, 51 and 68 – In what does Jesus fulfil the invitation held out in Isaiah 55?
9. What are some of the challenges we face in sharing God's word – the good news of Jesus – with others?
10. What encouragement does Isaiah 55 give us as we seek to share God's word – the good news of Jesus – with others?

2-15-21 John 1:1-18

1. Who is Jesus? How have people down through history answered that question? How would the average person on the street answer that question?
2. Why do you think there are such contrasting beliefs and opinions about who Jesus is?

1. Why do you suppose the Priests and Levites wanted to question John the Baptist?
2. What was John's attitude toward Jesus? Read 1:26-27. How did John's attitude toward his role in the ministry of Jesus affect his witness? Read John 3:25-30
3. All of us have a testimony about what God has done and is currently doing in our life. What can we do to make sure that our testimony or message is heard when we have opportunity to share it?
4. When we share our testimony with others, how important is our attitude? Can we be both confident and humble as we witness for Christ?
5. What would the average Israelite think about when John called Jesus the “Lamb of God”? Was John being intentional about the life and purpose of Jesus by calling him the “Lamb of God”?

Peanut Blossoms

3 1/2 cups flour
2 tsp. soda
1 tsp. salt
1 cup shortening
1/2 cup peanut butter
1 cup sugar
1 cup brown sugar
2 eggs
4 tbsp. Milk
1 tsp. vanilla



Roll in balls. Then roll in sugar. Place on cookie sheets. Bake 375* about 8 minutes. Remove from oven. Press down a chocolate candy (star or kiss) in middle until cookie cracks. Return to oven and bake 2-5 minutes longer

Cherry Coconut Bars

Pastry:

2 cups flour
1 cup butter
6 tbsp. powdered sugar

Mix with hands until smooth. Spread thin with fingers in 9 x 13 pan. Bake about 25 minutes.

Filling:

4 eggs, slightly beaten
2 cups sugar
1/2 cup flour
1 tsp. baking powder
1/2 tsp salt
2 tsp. vanilla
1 1/2 cup chopped nuts
1 cup coconut
1 cup quartered cherries

Spread on top of pastry (no need to cool). Bake 25 minutes. Cool and cut into bars.

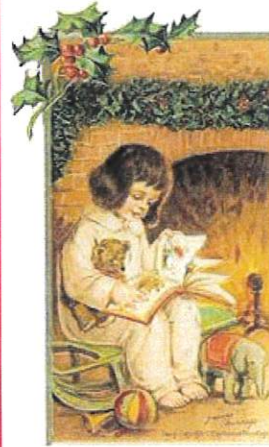
Puzzle Corner

Council Minutes November 16, 2021

The meeting was called to order at 6:05 PM by President Del Kangas.

Present: Jack Arthur, Carol Arthur, Del Kangas, Kandee Rosburg, Carol Skamser, Steve Shaw, Doris Maki, Julianne Koski, Andy Nelson, Bev Donaldson, and Pastor Sean.

Devotions: Pastor Sean led devotions and prayer taken from Amos 5:18.

Secretary's Report: A motion was made, seconded, and passed to approve the September 21, 2021, Council minutes as corrected. Coffee hour on Sunday morning begins at 8:45 AM.

Treasurers Report: Del reviewed the treasurer's report for October and noted a total income for the month of \$10,340.30 and total expenses of \$13,447.43 leaving a deficit of \$3,107.13.

Board Reports:

Deacons – Did not meet

Stewardship – Doris reported the following.

Black bags available near front door for collection of shoes for shoe drive.

Contact to be made to the various recipients of monies from Our Savior's

Congregation i.e. Sea Farers, CASDA, Salvation Army, United Faith

Methodist Church for feedback as to the effect these donations make in their organizations.

Board of Education – Julianne reported that.

Due to Covid19, the Sunday school will have a parade into the sanctuary with singing instead of a Christmas program.

Pens printed with Our Saviors Lutheran Church priced at \$3.00 each are for sale as a fund raiser.

Mission and Outreach – Carol reported that the food items for the Thanksgiving basket have been delivered to the Salvation Army. The Board will have 4 collections for clothing items in December each supported by a Thrivent card.

December 5 – Mittens, to be donated to Cooper Scholl, our Threads of Hope free closet and the Methodist Food shelf.

December 12 – Boot drive, ask donations from the congregation for gently used or new boots.

December 19 – Stocking drive for children or adults, for our Threads of Hope free closet and Salvation Army food shelf.

December 26 – Underwear for children, resupply our Threads of Hope free closet.

Trustees - Jack reported bill for boiler has been paid. Rebate forms have been completed. Jack also listed several areas the trustees are addressing including installation of a water heater, piping to the new boilers, demolition of a wall in the boiler room, finding a better place to store the snowblower in the winter and preparation of the 2022 budget. A candidate will be offered a 2-month temporary position as custodian starting December 6, 2021, at \$11.00 per hour and up to 9 hours per week.

A motion was made, seconded, and passed to accept, the secretary's, treasurers, and Board reports.

Pastor's report – Pastor Sean reported interest by several people to become members of Our Saviors and the addition of 2 more individuals to the confirmation classes.

Old Business – Volunteers are still needed to clean the church.
