11-03-21 1 Kings 19:1-18

- 1. Do true Christians ever become depressed? If they do, is it a sign of unbelief or lack of faith? If they don't, is it a mark of righteousness or spiritual maturity? Why or why not?
- 2. Elijah had performed many miracles and had seen God's power in seemingly impossible situations, yet when he is threatened by Jezebel he is afraid, depressed, and even wants to die. Why do you think Elijah responded to this threat in this way?
- 3. The angel of the Lord meets Elijah in the wilderness, but doesn't give him the answer he is seeking and gives him only enough food to sustain him on the next leg of his journey. Why draw out this encounter for 40 days?
- 4. God is made known in the silence and not in the loud manner of the earthquake or fire. Can you relate to this part of Elijah's story? Have you ever experienced God in the midst of silence?
- 5. In what ways can you relate to Elijah when he says, "I have had enough?"
- 6. Elijah complains that he is the only prophet still alive; yet, later in the chapter God tells him that hundreds of prophets are still alive. Can you share a time when you were so afraid or frustrated that the fear distorted your sense of what was really true?
- 7. Like Elijah, when we are afraid we may be tempted to hide in a cave from our fears. For some of us that might mean despair, surrounding ourselves with comfort, or cynicism and bitterness. How do you respond to fear?
- 8. What kind of "cave" do you find yourself in when you are afraid?
- 9. Have you ever experienced a time when God's presence helped direct you back to where he wanted you to be?
- 10. Why does God ask the question in vs 9 and 13? Where does the question imply Elijah should be?

11-10-21 Amos 1:1-2; 5:14-15, 21-24

- 1. How do justice and love relate in this passage?
- 2. If our own culture was in the place of Israel, what injustices would God be calling us to? What would repentance look like?
- 3. Do you think the people who "desire the Day of YHWH" (v18) are the same people who are holding festivals and bringing offerings (vv21-23)? Why?
- 4. What are YHWH's responses to the people's worship? Why?
- 5. What do we think it means to "let justice roll down like waters, and righteousness like an ever-flowing stream" (v24), concretely?
- 6. Why is judgment an important part of the Christian tradition?
- 7. Do you typically view your concern for justice as a part of your faith? How do you express it?
- 8. Is simply doing justice enough as an expression of faith, or is worship also important?
- 9. Have you seen examples of religious worship get in the way of doing justice? What happened? What is the point of worship if it can be corrupted so easily?
- 10. Why do you think so many people have found 5:21-24 moving and challenging?

11-17-21 Isaiah 9:1-7

- 1. Vs. 1-5, describe the life transformation that will happen when God brings deliverance for his people.
- 2. Vs. 6-7, how will God bring the deliverance? What are the specific characteristics of the new kingdom that this child will one day rule?
- 3. What does God promise at the start of v1, and what do you think he means?
- 4. Read Matt. 4:12-16. Notice anything?
- 5. Read Isaiah 9:2 and then John 8:12. What does it mean to say that Jesus is the light of the world?
- 6. How do you think hearing v2 might have helped the people during captivity?
- 7. Read 2 Corinthians 4:6. Where does the Bible tell us that the light of Jesus needs to shine, and do you know why this is?
- 8. What does the light of Jesus give us?
- 9. Jesus is the Prince of Peace. What difference does that make in our lives?
- 10. In v7, we start to find out what it will be like for Jesus to be King. What do you find?

11-24-21 Jeremiah 29:1, 4-14

- 1. What do you need to do to know it is God directing you, and not yourself?
- 2. "Seek to know him and not just seek to know about him." What do you think this means?
- 3. The Lord reminds his people, not of their situation, but of His significance. In times of struggle or crisis, why is this reminder what we need most?
- 4. God also reminds His people that their situation of exile is due to His sovereign choice. Why is this reality actually good news?
- 5. Why might vs. 5-7 be surprising to those enduring prolonged hardship?
- 6. What purposes might the Lord have had in calling his people to live with such purpose?
- 7. Read 1 Peter 2:18-25. How might the wisdom help us in our own struggles?
- 8. How does vs 11 help you in the midst of bad situations?
- 9. God promises that when the people pray and seek Him, He will lead them home. What does it mean for God to lead you back home?
- 10. How can we be intentional in "doing good" in our own circumstances?

12-01-21 Ezekiel 37:1-14

- 1. Why would God give Ezekiel a vision of a valley of dry human bones? What do these bones represent?
- 2. In v3, God asks Ezekiel if these bones can live. What is God trying to teach Ezekiel through this vision?
- 3. Ezekiel then responds. Does he learn anything? What does he learn?
- 4. Ezekiel was to preach to those in exile describing in detail the revival of these bones (flesh and breath restored). How might this give hope to those in exile?
- 5. V. 6, what is God's stated reason that He will restore those in Exile? Why is this important?
- 6. What is the significance of breaking this reanimation of life into two stages? (Hint: Word and Spirit)
- 7. How can we be more open to the Spirit in our lives, especially when sharing our faith?
- 8. God interprets the vision for Ezekiel: The exiled nation of Israel has lost all hope and God will restore this hope. What are the three parts of his hope and why is each one important?
- 9. What does the reanimation sequence indicate to us about how God works?
- 10. What is the significance of the breath? How is that applicable to our lives today?

- 5. Do you think God needed to afflict the Egyptians with the plagues to get them to set his people free? Why or why not?
- 6. Do you think God was unfair to Pharoah and the Egyptians?
- 7. Do you think the Israelites deserved their freedom?
- 8. Do you think God's law hurts or helps us?
- 9. Which of the Ten Commandments is most difficult for you to keep and why?
- 10. Have you ever felt like you were wandering through life with no real direction?
- 11. Do you think the Israelites were justified in their complaining while in the wilderness?
- 12. Do you think God provided well for the wandering Israelites?
- 13. Do you think it's easier to trust in God when things are going well or when you're suffering?
- 14. Do you think the Israelites deserved the Promised Land?
- 15. Do you think Joshua was a worthy leader of the Israelites after Moses died?
- 16. Why do you think the Exodus story is foundational to the identity of the Israelites?
- 17. Why is the Exodus story foundational to all Christians?
- 18. Do you think 40 years was too long or not long enough to wander in the wilderness?
- 19. Was Moses as brave as Abraham and Jacob and Joseph before him?

Norwegian Meatballs

1# beef ground fine

1/3# pork ground fine

½ cup milk

½ cup bread crumbs

2 teaspoons salt

1/4 teaspoon pepper

1/8 teaspoon ginger allspice nutmeg

1 egg

Mix thoroughly. Roll into meatballs (whatever size you like; for large size use thermometer to make sure they are cooked to 165*).

Fry on top of stove – stir often, don't burn. Place cooked meatballs in kettle. Combine 1 can Campbell's cream of chicken or cream of mushroom soup with ¾ can filled with milk. Pour over meatballs and combine. Simmer on low heat for 20-30 minutes. Serve over mashed potatoes, preferably homemade.



PUMPKIN SPICE CHEX MIX RECIPE Linda Clark



INGREDIENTS:

- 1 cup (2 sticks) unsalted butter, melted
- · 1 cup packed brown sugar
- · 3 tablespoons pumpkin spice
- · 2 tablespoons vanilla extract
- 1 (12 oz) box cinnamon chex cereal
- 1 (12 oz) box honey nut chex cereal
- 4 cups pretzels
- 1 (21 oz) bag autumn/harvest candy mix (or plain candy corn)

DIRECTIONS:


- In a medium bowl, whisk together butter, brown sugar, pumpkin pie spice and vanilla extract.
- In an extra large bowl, toss together both chex cereal flavors and pretzels. Pour butter mixture over the cereal mixture and toss to distribute.
- Microwave: Microwave uncovered for 6 minutes, stirring every 2 minutes. Spread on wax paper to cool. Add harvest candy mix and toss to combine. Store in airtight container.
- 4. Oven: Preheat oven to 275°F. Line two large baking sheets with parchment paper. Divide mixture on the two baking sheets and spread in even layers. Bake for 45 minutes, stirring every 15 minutes. Spread on wax paper to cool. Add harvest candy mix and toss to combine. Store in airtight container.

October 19, 2021

The meeting was called to order at 6:00 PM by President Del Kangas.

Present: Donna Liebaert, Julianne Koski, Jack Arthur, Carol Arthur, Del Kangas, Kandee Rosberg, Bonnie Wentzel, Carol Skamser, Steve Shaw, Bev Donaldson, and Pastor Sean.

Devotions: Pastor Sean led devotions and prayer taken from 1 Samuel chapter 5.

Secretary's Report: A motion was made, seconded, and passed to approve the September 21, 2021, Council minutes.

Treasurer's Report: Bonnie reported that September income was \$8,512.35 with expenses of \$12,325.84 leaving a deficit of -\$3,813.00. Bonnie further reported that \$5,000.00 was taken from the general fund to pay the mortgage. Additional funds were used to pay the fees to reduce the mortgage rate. New interest rate begins November 1st, 2021.

A motion was made, seconded, and passed to approve the treasurer's report.

Board of Education:

Winter coat giveaway on October 10th was very successful. Thanks to the 10 volunteers who assisted. The following items given away included 13 snowpants, 18 jackets, 14 boots, 16 hats, 13 gloves and mittens.
