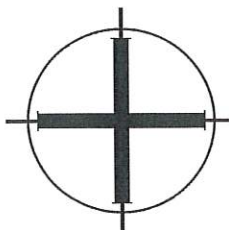

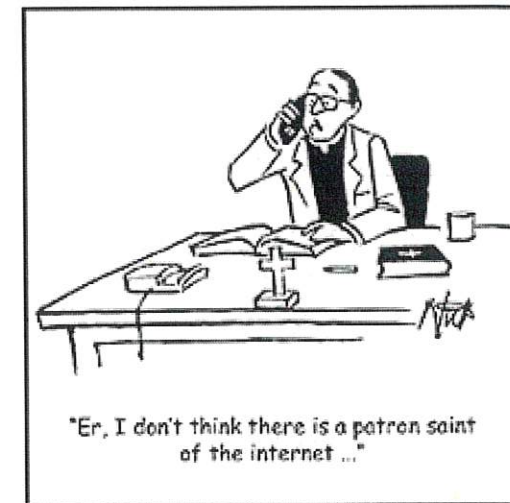

Script Cards Update

As a reminder Script cards are an easy way for you to make money for the church. You purchase a card through the church and then use it as you would any other gift card. The church receives a small percentage of the value but **you do not pay any more**. For the last 11 months of 2021 we made \$2100.00.

You can now also use reloadable cards. In January 2022 alone we earned \$90.00 with only 9 participants using reload cards.

Use Kwik Trip cards this month. They are giving a 9% rebate instead of the usual 4% from 01/29/2022 to 02/24/2022.

Do you pay for gas with a credit card? There are cards for Kwik Trip, Holiday and BP.

Buy groceries with a Walmart card or at Superior Meats.

Go out to eat at Applebees. Get fast food at Hardees, Burger King, Subway or Dairy Queen.

Pay for your prescriptions at CVS or Walgreens with a card.

A list of other participating national stores is in the narthex.

Bottom line : It's an easy way to do your shopping and help the church at the same time

Card orders go in every 3rd Sunday of the month. This month your orders need to be in by February 19th.

Are you having a Super Bowl Party? Here are some yummy snack ideas.

Taco Dip

1 8 oz. pkg. Philly Cream Cheese (at room temperature)

1/2 cup sour cream

1/2 pkg. taco seasoning

8 oz. shredded cheddar cheese

Shredded lettuce, chopped onion, chopped tomato and sliced olives

Mix cream cheese, sour cream and taco seasoning together. Spread on a plate. Sprinkle then in layers onion, tomato, black olives, and shredded lettuce. Finally top with the shredded cheese. Serve with tortilla chips.

Honey Roasted Chex Mix

3 cups Honey Nut Chex

1 cup Cheerios

1 1/2 cups Bugle original

1 cup pretzels or 1/2 cup honey roasted peanuts

2 tablespoons light corn syrup

2 tablespoons honey

1 tablespoon margarine or butter (do not use spread)

1/2 teaspoon vanilla

Heat oven to 325* Mix cereals, snacks and pretzels in large bowl. Heat corn syrup, honey and margarine in 1 quart saucepan over medium heat to boiling, stirring occasionally. Remove from heat and stir in vanilla. Pour over cereal mixture until evenly coated. Spread in ungreased 15 1/2 inch baking pan with sides. Bake 20 minutes, stirring after 10 minutes. Spread on waxed paper or aluminum foil. Cool completely. Break into bite size pieces. Store in airtight container.

Barbecue Beef Sliders

Bake one 5 lb. chuck roast with 1 jar Open Pit Regular BBQ Sauce and 1 quart ginger ale in a covered dish for 6 hours at 300*. Shred meat off the bone with a fork. Place back in the oven for an additional hour. Serve on slider (or regular size) buns.

From the Quilters and Sewers

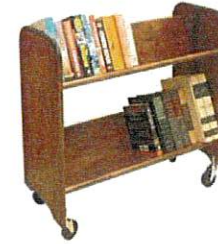

Council Minutes January 18, 2022

The meeting was called to order at 6:04 PM by President Del Kangas.

Present: Jack Arthur, Carol Arthur, Del Kangas, Kandee Rosburg, Carol Skamser, Bonnie Wentzel, Steve Shaw, Doris Maki, Donna Liebaert, Julianne Koski, Bev Donaldson, and Pastor Sean.

Devotions: Pastor Sean led devotions and prayer based on Matthew 16:13-19

Secretary's report – December minutes were approved as corrected. The used water heater was to be installed in the St. Paul's room rather than the Christopher Lounge

Treasurer's report – Bonnie reported actual income of \$13,088.20 with expenses of \$11,869.45 leaving a surplus of \$1218.75. It was moved, seconded, and passed to approve the treasurer's report.

Board Reports:

Deacons – Steve reported that the trees were taken down. The Deacons are requesting an updated current member roster. They plan to contact members who have been inactive. They had prayed for members of the congregation at each of their meetings.

Stewardship – Donna reported their focus is the shoe donations. Our Saviors is on the schedule to have our shoes collected in February or March.

Board of Education – Julianne reported that they had a dual meeting with the Sunday School teachers since 3 of the 6 board members are teachers. The enrollment continues to increase with 5 new students in December.

Mission and Outreach – Carol reported that the donations of mittens, scarves, and hats had gone well however, only a few sox were donated. The Ronald McDonald house will be the February focus for donations by the congregation. The used clothing earmarked for Camp McCoy refugees will be sent instead to the tornado victims in Kentucky. New Free Store has opened on Belknap Street sponsored by the Ruth House. Our Threads of Hope clothing closet may need some advertising as there has been little activity and it is over supplied.

Trustees – Jack reported that the newly hired custodian had submitted her 2 weeks' notice of resignation. Jack requested that Pastor Sean announce need for replacement during Sunday's church announcements. Boiler Rebate of \$2,940.00 received. An additional rebate is scheduled later in January or February according to conversation with SWLP. Jack reported that the Trustees had received a \$6,000.00 add-on bill from Belknap Plumbing to cover a hot water tank removal, eliminating pneumatic valves and adding WIFI option to remotely control thermostats in the sanctuary.

The toilet in the Christopher Lounge bathroom has been repaired. Trustees would like to keep 5 individuals on their board.

A motion was made, seconded, and passed to accept the Board reports.

Pastor's Report – Pastor Sean announced that Lent begins with Ash Wednesday on March 2nd and ends with Easter on April 17th. Mid-week Wednesday Services will begin at 6:30. Due to Covid 19, there will be no soup suppers. Tubing for all youth and their friends to be held Sunday afternoon, January 23rd. Funeral for Durae Lane will be held Saturday, January 29, 2022.

Old business – None

New Business – Nominating committee – Vice president and secretary candidates needed Annual meeting January 30 – need 50 members to meet quorum requirement.. Audit committee - motion made, seconded, and passed to appoint Doris Roeber, Lynne Hoff, and Jim Splinter to the audit committee.

Vision Victories – 1. Sunday School growing. 2. Youth tubing activities

3. Shoe collections 4. Income > expenses 5. New members joining on January 30.
