Greetings from your pastor and partner in ministry!!



What an interesting time to serve in the churches of Superior! For years, many have expressed concern that there are too many ELCA congregations to serve such a small population. Of course, each congregation serves a unique community within the larger community of Superior so the congregations have learned to co-exist. But dwindling resources and participation had added urgency to discussions concerning collaboration and/ or consolidation. The strains of the pandemic only heightened the urgency. Three of the five pastors either transitioned to retirement or new calls elsewhere thus creating leadership vacancies. Gracefully one of the vacancies was filled with an interim pastor but the other two vacancies remained unfilled. I reached out to synod and offered my help in whatever way needed. After several discussions, I've taken on the role of administrative interim pastor for Zion Lutheran for the next three months. My responsibilities include arranging supply pastors for Sunday worship and being available for visitations and funerals. Also, I will lead a first communion class and meet with the confirmation kids to ensure they are confirmed in May. At the end of the three months, I will transition into a supervisor role for an intern pastor who will then serve them for a year. This leaves both Pilgrim and Zion with solid leadership for the foreseeable future. The leadership of Bethel remains in uncertainty so we will continue to pray for them.

Otherwise, we have a full month of ministry in store for us. We will celebrate a post-pandemic Easter with eased restrictions. But not before we gather with our neighbors at Concordia and Pilgrim for joint Maundy Thursday and Good Friday services. We will worship here for the Maundy Thursday service and at Pilgrim for the Good Friday service, both at 6:30 p.m. We will welcome one of our students, Darren Porter, to receive his first communion at the Maundy Thursday service. You won't want to miss any of the Holy Week services! Also, be sure to plan on joining us for bingo at Pilgrim Lutheran on the 28<sup>th</sup> from 6:00-8:00 p.m. as a benefit for the conflict in Ukraine. See the flyer later in this newsletter for more details.

God continues to bless us with fruitful ministry. Let us be particularly grateful this Easter season. Thanks be to God!

After a successful fund-raising campaign, raising \$55,649. The new boilers have increased reliability, improved temperature control and increased energy efficiency. The new boilers have reduced gas usage by 25%, thus saving approximately \$2,000 to \$2,500 per year in utility expenses. Stop down to the boiler room and see our new boilers. # Dear OSLC Members,

We are sending you some great information about Scrip cards and how to use them. Here are some questions we are often asked.

**How do Scrip cards work?** You purchase a Scrip card through Carol Scamser and pay by check to OSLC. Her phone number is 715-781-0753. The cards can be used to purchase everyday items such as gas, groceries, pharmacy items, and at restaurants.

Where can I use them? Some local examples are; Kwik Trip, Holiday Gas, Walmart, Superior Meats, Wagreens, CVS, Menards, Home Depot, Arbees, Applebees, and Dominos.

How does this benefit OSLC? When you purchase these cards, a percentage of the purchase price is immediately given to the church. Each business has their own percentages listed. This helps the church with additional revenue.

How does this benefit me? Purchasing Scrip cards helps you give additional funds to OSLC while purchasing your everyday items without it costing you anything extra. (It also can help with planning and budgeting!) After each purchase the receipt you get shows the remaining balance of the card.

**How does this benefit the community?** When you use a Scrip card, the retailer gets cash up front and gets repeat business.


Some cards can be reloaded at any time by getting a check to Carol Scamser and keeping the same card. Kwik Trip, CVS, and Walmart are a few like this.

If you are ordering a new card, it must be done by the third Sunday of the month.

Watch your e-mails for monthly updates and Sneak Peaks about additional specials! Look on the back table for a couple of examples of how beneficial these cards can be for OSLC. Watch the announcements that come out every week for the amount realized from Scrip cards for the church.

- 1. What detail do the other Gospel writers include about Jesus carrying his own cross? Read Matthew 27:32;
- Mark 15:21; and Luke 23:26. How can this detail that the other Gospel writers include best be understood?
- 2. What was the purpose of making Jesus carry his own cross through the busy streets of Jerusalem to the place of execution?
- 3. When you think of Jesus carrying his own cross, what images, emotions, or thoughts come to your mind?
- 4. What do we learn from Luke's Gospel about the criminals that were crucified with Jesus? Read Luke 23:39 -43.
- 5. What is the important message that we can learn from the two criminals that were crucified with Jesus?
- 6. In how many languages was the inscription written? Why these languages? What was the purpose of making the inscription available in more than one language?
- 7. How did Pilate respond to the chief priests' request? Why does Pilate respond this way?
- 8. How does John's crucifixion account make his point that Jesus is the Son of God?
- 9. How should people react when they hear about Jesus' resurrection? Read Acts 2:37.
- 10. Respond to this statement: "The people who crucified Jesus are actually inaugurating him into his Kingdom."

# Blueberry French Toast

# NGREDIENTS:

12 slices day-old white bread, crusts removed 2 packages (8 ounces each) cream cheese 1 cup fresh or frozen blueberries 12 large eggs, lightly beaten 2 cups 2% milk 1/3 cup maple syrup or honey

# SAUCE:

1 cup sugar

1 cup water

2 tablespoons cornstarch

1 cup fresh or frozen blueberries

1 tablespoon butter

# Directions:

- Cut bread into 1" cubes; place 1/2 in greased 13/9 baking dish. Cut cream cheese into 1" cubes; place over bread. Top with blueberries and remaining bread cubes.
- 2. Whisk the eggs, milk and syrup in a large bowl. Pour over bread mixture. Cover and refrigerate 8 hours or overnight.
- 3. Remove from the refrigerator 30 minutes before baking. Cover and bake at 350\* for 30 minutes. Uncover and bake 25-30 until a knife inserted in center comes out clean.
- 4. Combine the sugar, water and cornstarch until smooth in a small saucepan. Bring to a boil over medium heat; cook and stir until thickened about 3 minutes. Stir in blueberries and bring to a boil. Reduce heat and simmer until berries burst, about 8 -10 minutes. Remove from heat, stir in butter. Serve with French toast.

The meeting was called to order by Vice-President Rick Gilbertson at 5:15 pm.

**Secretary's Report:** A motion was made, seconded, and passed to accept the February 15<sup>th</sup> council minutes.
