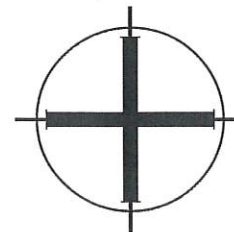

Good Day,

We have a busy but fun month ahead of us.

05-04-22 Acts 16:16-34

1. Describe the condition of the three people (Lydia, the slave girl, and the jailer) who encounter Christ in this chapter.
2. What encouragement or hope is drawn from the fact that God saves each of those people?
3. Notice how Paul and Silas handle their imprisonment in verse 25. How does our response to adversity/trials empower our witness?
4. What was it that motivated Paul and Silas to stay, even when the chains had been broken? Can you think of any examples where a Christian's commitment to a higher authority would lead them into harm's way?
5. Why were Paul and Silas in prison? What were their crimes and how severely were they punished? Did the "crime" fit the punishment? Why or why not?
6. Verse 25 says that it was not until "about midnight" that Paul and Silas began praying and praising. This is not in the text and just speculation, but what could have been their response to their circumstances leading up to that midnight hour?
7. What truths about God would lead Paul and Silas to pray and praise? Who was listening and what would their likely reaction be?
8. Why would the jailer consider suicide as his only option? When he asked Paul and Silas, "Sirs, what must I do to be saved?", do you believe he was asking in response to the gospel message or his physical salvation?
9. Describe the Biblical fellowship in verses 33-34. How would the Lord bless and provide for all involved in this incredible event?
10. Do you believe every Christian should live their lives with the same passion, zeal and resolve as Paul and Silas? Is their "radical Christianity" normal? Why or why not?

05-11-22 Acts 17:16-31

1. What kinds of philosophies and beliefs did Paul encounter in Athens? How would you describe the people of Athens that Paul spoke with—cultured or uncultured; intelligent or unintelligent?
2. How do we cope with a world that knows or cares so little about the truth of Jesus Christ? What did they misunderstand about what Paul was preaching? Is the resurrection of Jesus as unusual to people today as it was to Paul's listeners in Athens?
3. What distressed Paul as he went through the city of Athens? What did his distress lead him to do? What do we normally do in our contact with people of other religions?

4. What was Paul's response to being in a culture with so many gods? What did he preach?
5. How did the people respond to his preaching? What kinds of comments might we encounter as we preach and teach about the resurrection?
6. What evidence would you give for the reality of the resurrection? What evidence for the resurrection do you find in John 19:33-35; John 20:6-8; and 1 Corinthians 15:3-8?
7. Does God need anything (Psalm 50:8-13)? What aspect of God's character is Paul referring to? Why is this important to understanding God and salvation (Romans 11:33-35)?
8. What does God alone give (Genesis 2:7; Job 12:10; 33:4)? What did he tell them about God's sovereign choices?
9. What seemingly obvious statement does Paul make about idols and God (Psalm 115:4-8; Isaiah 44:9-20)? Why do people everywhere misunderstand this (Romans 1:18-23)?
10. Some say all religions are the same. What arguments does Paul use to contradict this notion?

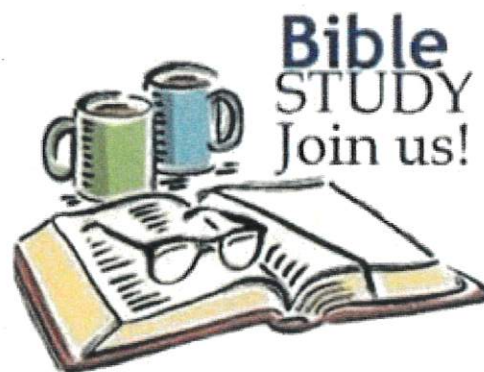
05-18-22 Philippians 1:1-18a

1. Paul uses the term brothers and sisters. What does that description indicate about Paul's feelings for the church at Philippi?
2. Do you think this description should apply to believers in all churches?
3. What are some things that prevent believers from experiencing an intimate level of fellowship with each other?
4. What does Paul see as a positive about his captivity?
5. Why is it difficult to find positive feelings when we are going through a very difficult trial or situation? What do you think was Paul's secret?
6. How does the whole palace guard know that Paul is a Christian? Wouldn't it be dangerous to share your faith with those who are guarding you? What compels Paul to share his faith?
7. Why do you think Paul's imprisonment has helped other believers living in Rome to share the Gospel with others?
8. If Paul was arrested for his faith in Christ, why aren't they afraid of being arrested?
9. Paul describes 2 groups in Rome. What are the differences between the 2 groups according to Paul?
10. Even though these two groups have different motives, what does Paul say is the result that outweighs the motives? (verse 18) Why do you think this makes Paul rejoice?

OSLC Cooks



We have some great cooks here at OSLC and we'd like to feature some of your recipes. Where are all the recipes for the delicious food you all bring to church gatherings? If you're willing to share, you can drop them off in the box in the narthex or drop them off or email them to the office. We can acknowledge you or you can remain anonymous.

This month we have some recipes suitable to bring to bake sales, graduation parties, barbeques, etc.

Cake Mix Caramel Brownies



Melt over low heat a 14 ounce package caramels with 1/3 cup evaporated milk.

Mix together one package chocolate cake mix, 1 cup nuts and 3/4 cup melted butter. Spread 3/4 of this mixture in a greased and floured 9x13 pan. Bake 6 minutes at 350*. Remove from oven and sprinkle a 6 ounce package of chocolate chips on top. Spread caramel mixture on top. Then crumble the remaining cake mixture on top of that. Bake an additional 15-18 minutes. Cool for 5 minutes. Then refrigerate for 1 hour. Cut and remove from pan.

Peanut Butter Cup Cookies

1/2 cup butter	1/2 cup sugar
1/2 cup packed brown sugar	1 large egg
1/2 cup creamy peanut butter	1/2 teaspoon vanilla
1 1/4 cup AP flour	3/4 teaspoon baking soda
1/2 teaspoon salt	

Reeses peanut butter cup minis



Combine the butter sugars, egg, peanut butter and vanilla. Beat until smooth. Combine flour, baking soda and salt. Add to creamed mixture. Roll into balls and place in greased mini muffin tin. Bake 8-9 minutes at 375*. Remove from oven. Gently press a peanut butter cup into each cookie.

Lemon Bars

Blend:

2 cups flour	1 cup margarine
1/2 cup powdered sugar	

Press in bottom of 9x13 pan. Bake at 350* about 20 minutes until starts to turn brown.

Beat together:

4 eggs	1/2 cup lemon juice
2 cups sugar	1/4 cup flour
1/2 teaspoon salt	1/2 teaspoon baking powder

Pour over baked crust and bake an additional 25 to 30 minutes. Sprinkle with powdered sugar.



REMEMBER TO USE SCRIP CARDS

Frequently asked questions—

How do Scrip cards work? You purchase a Scrip card through Carol Skamser and pay by check to OSLC. Her phone number is 715-781-0753. The cards can be used to purchase everyday items such as gas, groceries, pharmacy items, and at restaurants. If you purchase a new card, orders must be in by the third Sunday of the month. This month orders must be in by May 21st. Some of the cards can be reloaded by simply calling Carol Skamser at any time and getting a check to her. After each purchase the receipt you get shows the remaining balance of the card.

Where can I use them? Some local examples are; Kwik Trip, Holiday Gas, Walmart, Superior Meats, Walgreens, CVS, Menards, Home Depot, Arbees, Applebees, and Dominos. There are many more. There is a list of available cards in the narthex or ask Carol.

How does this benefit OSLC? When you purchase these cards, a percentage of the purchase price is immediately given to the church. Each business has their own rebate percentages. This helps the church with additional revenue. **For January- Mid March 2022, Scrip Card usage by 8 people has realized \$826.73 profit for OSLC.** Watch the announcements each week for the amount realized by using Scrip cards. Some businesses will also often have specials increasing the % they give back. Watch your email for details.

How does this benefit me? Purchasing Scrip cards helps you give additional funds to OSLC while you purchase your everyday items without it costing you anything extra.

How does this benefit the community? When you use a Scrip card, the retailer gets cash up front and gets repeat business.

Readers—Remember the Book Cart

Bring in books you have already read and exchange them for another. There are also books on CD available. The cart is located in the basement at the bottom of the steps from the middle doors.

While there are some children's books on the Book Cart, remember the Little Blue Bookshelf across from the Children's Clothes Closet.

Puzzle Corner

We also now have jigsaw puzzles available. They are located with the book cart in the basement by the middle staircase. Like with the books, you can take a jigsaw puzzle of your choice. When you are finished, you can keep it or return it and take another. You can also donate any puzzles that you have.
