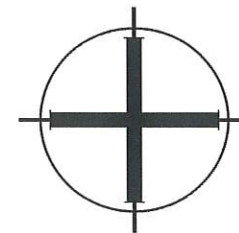

Pastor and I attended the **Synod Assembly** April 30th. The theme this year was "**Taking It To The Streets, Becoming a Public Church**". So, what does that mean? My interpretation of what that meant was:

We as a congregation have to be better listeners to what the needs are in our community. We have to ask ourselves what is one thing that would help us to become a more public church? We have to live our baptism.

And last, we have to listen to God, members, neighbors, community, and leaders.

Resolution 1 that was passed "**Care of Creation**". This is considered a teaching resolution. What it means is that we need to **reduce, reuse, and recycle**. They suggested that churches create "green teams" to look into this.

Resolution 2 that was also passed "**Intentional Conversations About Loving Our Neighbors**". This is also considered a teaching resolution that went along with last year's resolutions on "Gender Equality, Racial Justice, and Education and Resources on LGBTQIA+". What these basically say is what **Jesus** told us, "**Love one another**". Jesus accepted everyone and that is what these resolutions are asking of us to just accept. So, make sure we continue to welcome anyone that walks into our church and make they feel welcome.

OSLC Cooks



We have some great cooks here at OSLC and we'd like to feature some of your recipes. Where are all the recipes for the delicious food you all bring to church gatherings? If you're willing to share, you can drop them off in the box in the narthex or drop them off or email them to the office. We can acknowledge you or you can remain anonymous.

Here are recipes for some summertime desserts.

Rhubarb Custard Pie

3-4 cups finely chopped
rhubarb

1/2 tablespoon soda

1 cup sugar

2 1/2 tablespoons orange juice



Grated rind of one orange

2 well beaten egg yolks

Pinch of salt

4 tablespoons flour

Sprinkle rhubarb with soda. Cover with boiling water for a few minutes. Drain well. Fill unbaked pie crust with the rhubarb.

Cover with uncooked custard of sugar, juice, rind, egg yolks, salt and flour. Bake at 350* until custard is lightly brown and rhubarb is tender. Top with meringue.

Make meringue with 2 beaten egg whites and 2 tablespoons of sugar. Add 1 tablespoon of cold water and whip.

Fruit Pizza

Pillsbury Sugar Cookie, tube dough

18 ounces cream cheese

1/2 cup powdered sugar

1 8 ounce bowl Cool Whip

Fresh fruit of choice: strawberries,
bananas, kiwi, etc.



Bake cookie dough as directed in a round pizza pan. Cool. Beat cream cheese and powdered sugar together until creamed. Add the Cool Whip. Spread on to of cooled cookie dough. Arrange fruit on top.

Fresh Raspberry Pie

1 graham cracker crust

3 tablespoons cornstarch

1 cup sugar

3 cups raspberries

3 ounce package of cream
cheese, softened

2 tablespoons raspberry Jello



Carefully spread the cream cheese on the graham cracker crust, sides and bottom. Arrange 2 cups of the raspberries on the crust. Sprinkle the dry raspberry Jello over the crust. Boil together the cornstarch, sugar and water until thick. Add the remaining cup of raspberries and pour over the pie. Bake at 450* for 15 minutes. Decrease temperature to 375* and bake an additional 30 minutes.

REMEMBER TO USE SCRIP CARDS

Frequently asked questions—

How do Scrip cards work? You purchase a Scrip card through Carol Skamser and pay by check to OSLC. Her phone number is 715-781-0753. The cards can be used to purchase everyday items such as gas, groceries, pharmacy items, and at restaurants. If you purchase a new card, orders must be in by the third Sunday of the month. This month orders must be in by June 19th. Some of the cards can be reloaded by simply calling Carol Skamser at any time and getting a check to her. After each purchase the receipt you get shows the remaining balance of the card.

Where can I use them? Some local examples are; Kwik Trip, Holiday Gas, Walmart, Superior Meats, Walgreens, CVS, Menards, Home Depot, Arbees, Applebees, and Dominos. There are many more. There is a list of available cards in the narthex or ask Carol.

How does this benefit OSLC? When you purchase these cards, a percentage of the purchase price is immediately given to the church. Each business has their own rebate percentages. This helps the church with additional revenue. **For January-Mid March 2022, Scrip Card usage by 8 people has realized \$826.73 profit for OSLC.** Watch the announcements each week for the amount realized by using Scrip cards. Some businesses will also often offer specials increasing the % they give back. Watch your email for details.

How does this benefit me? Purchasing Scrip cards helps you give additional funds to OSLC while you purchase your everyday items without it costing you anything extra.

How does this benefit the community? When you use a Scrip card, the retailer gets cash up front and gets repeat business.

Opening Greeting: The meeting was called to order by President Kandee Rosburg at 5:15 pm.

Devotions/Prayer: Pastor Sean led devotions and prayer based on a reading from Acts.

Secretary's Report: A motion was made, seconded, and passed to accept the April 19th council minutes.

Treasurer's Report: April's income was \$11,249.60, expenses were \$12,017.60. The April mortgage payment was made from the Building Fund. The May 7th Rummage Sale brought in \$5,388.47 and was entered into the Building Fund account. Thank you to Kandee and all those helping with the sale.

A motion was made, seconded, and passed to accept the Treasurer's report.

Board Reports:

Deacons: Dave reported he will be looking for readers and communion assistants for June. Pastor Sean's church membership visits are going well.

Stewardship: Donna Liebaert organized the Shoe Drive with a profit of \$600 and about 1,500 pairs donated. The board would like to see participation in the Scrip card program increase. YTD profit is approximately \$1,200. They are looking into a similar program through Amazon. They also discussed having some adult member activities at the church.

Board of Education: Four Confirmation students were confirmed Sunday, May 15th. The last day of Sunday School is May 22nd, with a Teacher Appreciation gathering after the service.

Trustees: Empire Roofing is developing a plan to repair the roof leaks.

A stained-glass inspector looked at our windows and valued each one at \$63,000.00. Maintenance is needed in some glass areas and updating for the outside plexiglass was suggested.

In June, Zion Lutheran will be getting an intern for one year. Pastor will be her off-site supervisor. Pilgrim Lutheran's Pastor Carolyn would like to hold a joint summer service on August 4th. A picnic and a Bluegrass band are in the lineup.

Old Business: It was decided to advertise for a new custodian.

New Business: Sharing the Peace is once again on hold due to Covid.

Pastor Sean and Kandee attended the Synod Assembly. Synod Resolutions were passed with a theme called "Taking It to the Streets: Becoming a Public Church".

We will look into discussing it within the council or as a congregation.
