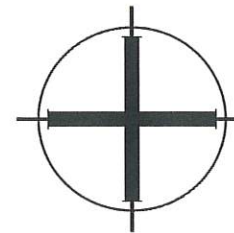

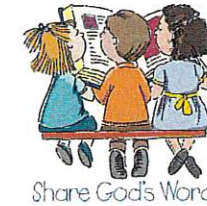

09-07-22 Genesis 6:5-22; 8:6-12; 9:8-17

1. Noah is described as "righteous" and "blameless." What impression does this give us about Noah?
2. What do we understand "walking with God" to mean?
3. Vs 11 tells us "the earth was corrupt in God's sight, and the earth was filled with violence."

Similarities/differences with our own time and place?

4. What does vs 22 tell us about Noah in relation to vs 9?
5. In light of Heb 11:7, What does it mean that Noah did what he did "by faith"?
6. Why does God so emphatically announce that He will never again destroy the earth with a flood?
7. God states explicitly that human beings are bent towards evil from youth. What are the implications of this revelation? Does this mean that human beings can never "be good" or do good?
8. Is the story of the flood and its aftermath a story of: God's wrath; God's justice; God's redemption; God's mercy or grace; God's providence; God's love; other? Why?
9. Should the story lead human readers to: fear God; trust God; obey God; love God; other? Why?
10. God's promise (covenant) is joined to a physical element (the rainbow). Why do you think that is important and what other covenants from God are joined to physical elements?

09-14-22 Genesis 12:1-9

1. What promises or commands of God did Abram receive that he believed in? Which of the promises to Abraham appeal to you the most? Why?
2. Why does God promise Abram a great name (vs 2) when God foiled the name building efforts of others (6:4 ff & 11:4 ff)?
3. How does that fact that Abraham was 75 and Sarai was 65 when they left on this journey make you feel? As you grow older, what would you like to accomplish? ...for God's Kingdom?
4. Would you rather "be blessed" and "be a blessing?" What is the difference?

5. What difference does it make that God made promises to Abram instead of giving him laws to follow

(see Galatians 3:1-9).

6. Why do you think God didn't tell Abram up front where he would be going?
7. Why do you think God didn't extend the invitation to the entire family – Abram's father and brothers included?
8. In what ways is this very first experience between God and Abram representative of everyone's experience with God throughout history?
9. How many of God's promises did Abram get to experience to some degree in his lifetime?
10. Did Abram's "waiting" dissolve his faith? (Heb. 11:13; Rom. 4:17-22).

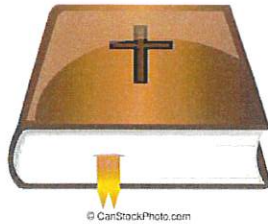
09-21-22 Genesis 39:1-23

1. What kinds of situations do people find themselves in that are beyond their control? What kind of situation is Joseph in?
2. Who has power in this story? What does the power of each look like? Is Joseph ever powerless?
3. How can bad situations be successful with God's help?
4. What does Joseph's example show us about how God invites us to use our power?
5. What kind of success is God interested in? Who benefits?
6. Should Joseph have been more discerning when he went into the house to do his work and knowing that Mrs. Potiphar was a persistent seductress?
7. Did Potiphar truly believe his wife's accusation of Joseph?
8. Wouldn't it be understandable to give in to Potiphar's wife? After all, he had been deserted by his family. Would that make it right?
9. What is the difference between explainable and excusable behavior?
10. If Joseph had given in to Potiphar's wife, would that have been explainable behavior or excusable behavior?

Bible study questions continued

9-28-22 Exodus 14:5-7, 10-14, 21-29

1. How does Pharaoh end up showing his true colors (14:5,8)? Why do you think God is concerned that the Egyptians will know that I am Lord? Compassion? Justice? Vengeance?
2. How equipped were the Egyptians? The Israelites? How did that make the Israelites react?
3. Instead of that revolutionary cry, "Give me liberty, or give me death," what is the cry of the Hebrews? Why do you think slavery is preferable to death for them?
4. What pressures were piling up for Moses? How does he handle the stress?
5. How would God's glory be reflected in this miracle? In the Egyptians' death? In the Hebrews' salvation?
6. What do you think it meant to the Israelites that the same sea which "piled up" in their favor also destroyed the Egyptians?
7. How do you think the Israelites would have described God to someone who had not seen these events firsthand?
8. In what ways might this passage help one to trust God with their fears?
9. Why do you think that Israel, despite having been protected through the 10 plagues still couldn't trust God? How difficult must it have been to be still and let God fight?
10. Why did God squeeze his people into a corner where they were stuck between the Egyptians and the Red Sea? Do you think the Lord sometimes has to take us on a more difficult route so that we might completely trust him?

Strengthening Ministry - Today, Tomorrow, Together

Matthew 13:32 : “It is the smallest of all the seeds, but when it has grown it is the greatest of shrubs and becomes a tree, so that the birds of the air come and make nests in its branches.”

This passage beautifully illustrates an image of something so small growing into a vibrant network and support system. This, in many ways is symbolic of your Synod Endowment Fund. Since its planting in 2001, the Fund has continued to sprout new branches and has supported dozens of ministries by:

- Encouraging whole life stewardship
- Strengthening and resourcing the ministry of the synod and
- Enhancing the ministry of the synod in addition to, and apart from, its yearly operating budget, with emphasis on, but not limited to:
 - Strengthening congregational vitality
 - Developing ministry for the next generation and
 - Equipping and supporting new leaders through seminary debt assistance, training, and lay leader development

Since inception, the fund has grown to almost a half million dollars and has gifted over two hundred and fifty thousand dollars. In the last five years, the Endowment Fund has made gifts to ministries totaling over \$200,000 with \$81,000 of that total given toward Seminary debt assistance.

This year alone, the Endowment Fund gifted over \$47,000 to various congregations and ministries with almost \$20,000 of that total going to Seminary debt assistance. As you can see, the Endowment Fund has been actively supporting ministries throughout the church by not only speaking of God’s Love but putting that Love into action.

The goal over the next two years is to increase the endowment fund by \$125,000 and to generate future commitments of an additional \$150,000. The Endowment Fund is committed today and into the future to assist and support churches, ministries, and seminarians with their ministry journeys. **Therefore, the Endowment Fund is asking for your partnership through a gift to help ministries of the church in their journey.** Gifts may be cash or an optional future financial commitment. 2022 Churchwide Assembly Report

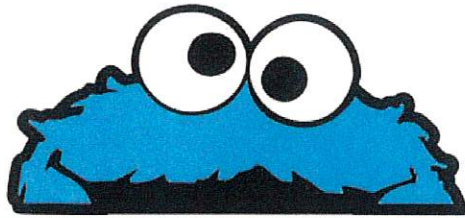
What a blessing it was to serve as a rostered leader representative of our synod for the assembly this summer! It was the first large gathering I've been to in almost three years since the pandemic nightmare began. I enjoyed not only being a part of such mass humanity again but to be among friends. I always enjoy being with Bishop Laurie and fellow pastors in our synod and it was good to meet lay leaders as well. Oh, and to see familiar colleagues from Nebraska was particularly comforting. It seems like a lifetime ago that I was serving down there!

The assembly itself was both inspiring and affirming. It was awesome to be in the same room as all 65 bishops and their synod delegates as well as the leaders of all the ELCA colleges and seminaries. And Bishop Eaton led the assembly with such humility and humor. What a gift we have with her leadership! Early in the week, she stood before the 800+ people gathered and offered an hour-long formal apology to the leaders of the congregation in the Sierra Pacific synod that endured great racial tension and suffering in the last year. I won't go into details about it (simply google Sierra Pacific controversy) but Bishop Eaton's response was powerful and hopefully healing can begin in that congregation. The assembly elected a new vice president, Imran Saddiqui, over the 4 days. He won the assembly over with his honesty and wry humor. Who knew these were two qualities that us Lutherans highly appreciate?! Several memorials were also voted into enactment having to do with a variety of topics including restructuring the governance of the ELCA, human sexuality, fortifying urban ministries, black migrant strategy, etc. The ELCA is known for its strong commitment to social justice issues, and this was reflected by the passing of so many memorial statements. The assembly particularly enjoyed a presentation from a professor of Luther Seminary, Rev. Anthony Bateza, reflecting on the current state of the church and the problem of mass distrust of the major institutions in our world. His wisdom and optimism only inspired greater trust and hopefulness in at least the ELCA contingent of the church. The worship services were diverse and joyful, and I even sang in the choir for the closing service. All in all, it was a privilege to participate in the gathering and I strongly encourage others to join the synod when it gathers again in Phoenix, AZ in 2025.

OSLC COOKS

School is starting and fall is in the air. Here are some cookie recipes for those lunch boxes and after school snacks.



Chocolate Chip Cookies

2 1/4 cups flour	1 tsp. baking soda
1 tsp. Kosher salt	1 cup softened butter
3/4 cup white sugar	3/4 cup packed brown sugar
1 tsp. vanilla extract	2 large eggs
2 cups semi-sweet chocolate chips	
1 cup chopped nuts (Optional. If omitting, add 1 to 2 tbsp. flour.)	

In small bowl, combine flour, baking soda and salt. In large bowl beat butter, both sugars and vanilla extract until creamy. Add eggs one at a time to large bowl, beating well after each addition. Beat in flour mixture gradually. Stir in chips and nuts. Drop onto

Oatmeal Cranberry White Chocolate Chip Cookies

2/3 cup butter	2/3 cup brown sugar
2 large eggs	1 1/2 cups old fashioned oats
1 1/2 cups flour	1 tsp. baking soda
1/2 tsp. salt	1—6 ounce package Craisins
2/3 cup white chocolate chips	

Beat butter and sugar together until light and fluffy. Add eggs. In separate bowl, combine oats, flour, baking soda and salt. Add to butter mixture in several additions, mixing well after each addition. Add Craisins and white chocolate chips. Drop by teaspoonfuls unto ungreased cookie sheet. Bake at 375* for 10-12 minutes .

Banana Oatmeal Raisin Cookies

1 1/2 cup shortening	2 1/2 cups flour
2 cups brown sugar	2 tsp. salt
1 cup white sugar	2 tsp. cinnamon
2 eggs	2 tsp. soda
1 tsp. vanilla	1 tsp. cloves
2 cups mashed bananas	2 cups raisins
6 cups oatmeal	

Mix. Drop by rounded teaspoon on ungreased cookie sheet. Bake at 350* for 12-15 minutes.

REMEMBER TO USE SCRIP CARDS

How do Scrip cards work? You purchase a Scrip card through Carol Skamser and pay by check to OSLC. Her phone number is 715-781-0753. The cards can be used to purchase everyday items such as gas, groceries, pharmacy items, and at restaurants. If you purchase a new card, orders must be in by the third Sunday of the month. This month orders must be in by September 17th. Some of the cards can be reloaded by simply calling Carol Skamser at any time and getting a check to her. After each purchase the receipt you get shows the remaining balance of the card.

Where can I use them? Some local examples are; Kwik Trip, Holiday Gas, Walmart, Superior Meats, Walgreens, CVS, Menards, Home Depot, Arbees, Applebees, and Dominos. There are many more. There is a list of available cards in the narthex or ask Carol.

How does this benefit OSLC? When you purchase these cards, a percentage of the purchase price is immediately given to the church. Each business has their own rebate percentages. Also check the table in the narthex for any bonus offers this month. This helps the church with additional revenue.

Remember purchasing Scrip cards helps you give additional funds to OSLC without it costing you anything extra..

For January– through August 2022, Scrip Card usage allowed \$1900 to be contributed toward the church mortgage.

Readers—Remember the Book Cart

Bring in books you have already read and exchange them for another. There are also books on CD available. The cart is located in the basement at the bottom of the steps from the middle doors.

While there are some children's books on the Book Cart, remember the Little Blue Bookshelf across from the Children's Clothes Closet.

Puzzle Corner

We also now have jigsaw puzzles available. They are located with the book cart in the basement by the middle staircase. Like with the books, you can take a jigsaw puzzle of your choice. When you are finished, you can keep it or return it and take another. You can also donate any puzzles that you have at home.

Minutes for OSLC Council Meeting – August 16, 2022

Opening Greeting: The meeting was called to order by President Kandee Rosburg at 5:15pm.

Present: Pastor Sean Koos, Linda Clark, Diane Erickson, Kim Erickson, Dave Kringle, Donna Liebaert, Dori Maki, Andy Nelson, Dustin Puchalla, Kandee Rosburg, Bonnie Wenzel.

Devotions/Prayer: Pastor Koos led devotions and prayer. The upcoming readings will be from the Book of Ruth. Pastor reflected upon the travels of Ruth and Naomi and their expectations.

Secretary's Report: A motion was made, seconded, and passed to accept the June 21st council minutes.

Treasurer's Report: The income for June was \$9,694.39, expenses were \$11,274.05. July's income was \$10,264.70, expenses were \$9,894.15. A motion was made, seconded, and passed to accept the report.

Board Reports:

Deacons: No report

Stewardship: Scrip card displays will be set up to encourage sales. Linda Gran is looking into adding OSLC to the Amazon Smile fundraising project. More information to follow.

A church game night was discussed.

The annual fall pledge letter will be sent out in October.

Board of Education: The Board would like to change the Sunday School start time to 9:30am with children and teachers attending the church service until after the children's sermon, and then class

continuing downstairs until 10:45. Coffee hour available before and after the 9:30 service.

Mission & Outreach: National Night Out was very successful with 65 in attendance. The Police and Fire Departments were present, complete with a fire engine.

Trustees: The peak & valley sides of the church roof are being redone with a water proof membrane and new shingles. A grant was received to cover the cost of a new shed to store the lawn mower & snow blower.

A motion was made, seconded, and passed to accept the board reports.

Pastor Koos's Report: Pastor attended the National Churchwide Assembly in Columbus, Ohio. Highlights included passing a series of memorials and the election of a new Vice President. There was an apology from a Washington Bishop to a congregation on how she handled the firing of a pastor. He said overall it was a good affirming experience.

OSLC will have a new member soon. Sunday School starts September 11th with Rally Sunday. Confirmation students in 7th & 8th grade and parents will meet September 7th to go over the format. Classes will start September 14th.

Old Business: We will try to sell the old water heater.
