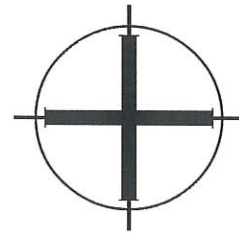

*11-02-22 2 Kings 5:1-15a*

1. There are all kinds of diseases and afflictions that might strike us while we live. If you could pick one disease or illness and know you'd never get it, which one would you pick and why?
2. What does this story teach us about faith? Which character(s) show(s) the most faith in God to be able to heal and act in the world? Which one(s) seem(s) to have the least faith in God's power? Is that surprising?
3. Why is Naaman mad when he is told to go wash in the Jordan River? What do you think he was expecting?
4. Why do you think Jesus used this story in his sermon in Luke 4:20-30?
5. What does Naaman's story teach us about the breadth of God's love and what does that mean for us?
6. How did it help Naaman that God (through Elisha) chose the Jordan to wash and heal him?
7. How can our unwillingness to humble ourselves actually deprive us of good gifts from God?
8. Why do you think Naaman's cleansing was a conversion experience for him?
9. Why would it have compromised the name of God and His prophet if Elisha had accepted payment for Naaman's healing?
10. How did Gehazi underestimate Elisha's relationship with God?

*11-09-22 Micah 1:3-5; 5:2-5a; 6:6-8*

1. (1:3-5) How is God characterized in these verses? What can God do to nature when He judges?
2. Why would you be fearful of experiencing God's judgment?
3. (5:2-5a) What type of leadership is promised? In what will the people trust for their strength?
4. What do you learn about this future ruler from the last part of v. 2 and the first part of v. 3, and why is this important?
5. In whose strength does the shepherd function, and what is meant by the phrase "in the majesty of the name of the Lord his God" (Micah 5:4)?
6. What results will Judah experience from the rule of this Shepherd-King?

- . (6:6-8) What does God desire of you? What is the central cause of Israel's separation from God?
8. Why is it important that we read Micah 6:6 within the context of the chapter's previous 5 verses?
9. What does it mean to "act justly"? "love faithfulness"? "walk humbly with [our] God"?
10. Why do God's people often need the reminder that our hearts, not our actions, are the true test of our faithfulness?

*11-16-22 Isaiah 36:1-3, 13-20; 37:1-7; then 2:1-4*

1. What was the Assyrian field commander's purpose in approaching the city ahead of the army?
2. Why was humility and mourning an appropriate response on the part of the leaders of Judah?
3. What falsehood stands out among the Assyrian's true assessments of the predicament of Jerusalem?
4. Why would it be useful for an enemy to undermine your confidence in your leaders?
5. How can Christians stand firm even when they are aware of their own weakness and the strength of an enemy?
6. What kind of person was Hezekiah? (2 Kings 18:3, 5-6.) What did he do to stop the people from worshiping idols? (2 Kings 18:4.) How was he blessed for his righteousness? (2 Kings 18:7)
7. Why do you think Hezekiah and his officials came to God with repentance before they presented their requests?
8. What perspective does a believer have with respect to the awesome powers of this world?
9. (2:1-4) These verses are almost identical to Micah 4:1-3. Why will many people/nations come to the mountain of the LORD's temple?
10. What do mountains symbolize here? What does the mountain of the Lord symbolize? Notice that the mountain of the Lord is "exalted" above the others – what does this mean?

*11-23-22 NO BIBLE STUDY (THANKSGIVING)*





11-30-22 Esther 4:1-17

1. Where is God when bad things happen? The book of Esther doesn't mention God. Why do you think that might be the case? Where do you see God's intervention and providence being worked out?
2. When Mordecai hears the edict, he tears his clothes and clothes himself in sackcloth and ashes. What's your response to seeing injustice and evil around you? What can Mordecai's response to injustice and evil teach us about our own?
3. Sackcloth and ashes are also a sign of repentance (see Jonah 3:5-6). Why is repentance an important part of asking God for mercy?
4. What does Esther's initial response in verse 11 tell us about what she was feeling? How does her response change in verse 16? "...if I perish, I perish."
5. What does Mordecai's response in verse 14 tell us about his faith in God?
6. How does Esther tell us about Jesus and the gospel in this passage? What about her actions point forward to the things Jesus will do?
7. How did Esther's faith help her make her decision? What role does our faith play in our decision making?
8. Has keeping a secret or maintaining a loyalty with someone ever put you in a dilemma? If so, how did you decide what to do?
9. Notice Mordecai's speech in 4:12-14. What stands out to you about Mordecai's faith? How does Mordecai's reasoning show his trust in God?
10. How might Mordecai's words, "Who knows? Perhaps you have come to royal dignity for just such a time as this" apply to you?

1. What is adultery and why do you think we have a commandment not to commit it?
2. Is committing adultery more than just a physical act? Why is the mental act just as severe in God's eyes? What harm does it do to the lustful person?
3. What advantages are there to abstinence before marriage? Can you think of any disadvantages?
4. Why is it wrong to steal? Is it ever right to steal?
5. Is stealing someone's time really stealing? What other kinds of stealing can you think of?
6. Have you ever had anything stolen from you? If so, what was your emotional reaction? How did it make you feel?
7. Describe a world in which stealing did not exist. How would it differ from today's society? What would no longer be necessary? What freedoms would we experience?
8. Why is lying a bad thing? Are "little white lies" bad things? Why?
9. Why does it seem so easy for people to lie?
10. Have you ever been lied to? If so, how did it make you feel?
11. Why is honesty the best policy in dealing with others?
12. What does it mean to "covet"? Is this commandment outdated or not? Explain.
13. Which other commandments might you break in coveting your neighbor's home and possessions?
14. How does coveting harm your relationship with your neighbor?
15. How could breaking the first commandment lead to breaking all the other commandments?
16. Why do we need God's commandments?
17. Can you think of any other commandments that are just as important, if not more, than the Ten?
18. How do the commandments reflect Jesus' great two commandments?
19. Can you rate the importance of the commandments? If so, how would you rate them?
20. Do you think the world would be a better place if everyone simply abided by the Ten Commandments? Why or why not?

## OSLC Cooks

Do you want to try a little twist to some traditional Thanksgiving favorites?



### Pumpkin Cheesecake

9 graham crackers (2 1/2 squares) made into crumbs.

1 cup low-fat (1%) cottage cheese

3/4 cup part-skim ricotta cheese

3/4 cup egg substitute

1/2 cup sugar

1 teaspoon ground ginger

1 teaspoon vanilla extract

1/2 teaspoon nutmeg

1/2 teaspoon cinnamon

1/8 teaspoon salt

One 15 ounce can pumpkin puree

Preheat oven to 350 \*F. Spray 9" glass pie plate with nonstick cooking spray.

Sprinkle graham cracker crumbs over the bottom of the pie plate.

In a food processor or blender, combine the cottage cheese, and ricotta; process until smooth about 1 minute. Transfer to a large bowl. Stir in the egg substitute, sugar, ginger, vanilla extract, nutmeg, cinnamon and salt. Reserve 1/4 of the batter. Add the pumpkin to the remaining batter, stir until blended. Place in crust.

Sprinkle the reserved batter in 3 concentric circles over the batter. With a knife, lightly draw a line through the batter from the center to the outer edge.

About 2 inches from that line lightly draw a line from the outer edge to the center.

Repeat around the pie, alternating directions to make a spider web. Bake at 350\* about 45-50 minutes or until a knife inserted in the center comes out clean. Keep refrigerated until ready to serve.

### Beer Cheese Green Bean Casserole

5 tablespoons butter, divided

1/4 cup flour

1 cup 2% milk

1/2 cup lager beer

1 1/2 cups shredded cheddar cheese

1/2 teaspoon salt

1/2 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce

1/8 teaspoon cayenne pepper

1/8 teaspoon smoked paprika

6 cups frozen cut green beans, thawed

1 tablespoon finely chopped onion

1/2 cup dry bread crumbs

Preheat oven to 350\*. In a large saucepan, melt 4 tablespoons butter over medium heat. Stir in flour until smooth, gradually whisk in milk and beer. Bring to a boil, stirring constantly. Cook and stir until thickened, 1-2 minutes. Stir in cheese, salt, Worcestershire sauce, cayenne pepper and paprika until blended. Add green beans and onion; stir to combine.

Transfer to a greased 2-quart casserole dish. Melt remaining 1 tablespoon of butter and stir into bread crumbs. Sprinkle over casserole. Bake, uncovered, until bubbly and top is golden brown,, 30-35 minutes.

### Orange-Maple Cranberry Sauce

In a saucepan, combine 2 cups fresh cranberries, 1/2 cup each orange juice and maple syrup and 1/4 cup each golden raisins and chopped walnuts. Bring the mixture to a boil. Reduce heat; simmer until cranberries start to burst and the mixture thickens, stirring occasionally.

**Devotions/Prayer:** Pastor read from the Book of Samuel and shared his insights.

**Secretary's Report:** A motion was made, seconded, and passed to accept the September 20<sup>th</sup> council minutes.

**Treasurer's Report:** Income for September was \$9,040.84. Expenses were \$13,327.08. September expenses include the first of 4 insurance installments of \$2,122.75. A motion was made, seconded, and passed to accept the treasurer's report.

**Board Reports:**

Deacons: Prayer Request & We Care Cards will be placed in the pews. The Velcro fasteners on some of the Communion robes need to be cleaned or replaced.

Stewardship: The committee is working 2023 Pledge Cards, letter and promotion. The Bazar/Vendor Fair is scheduled for December 3<sup>rd</sup>. A chairperson is needed.

Board of Education: Programs are running smoothly.

Mission & Outreach: Rev. Douglas Paulson, director of The Seafarers Center, will be contacted to find what their needs are. Planning for a Blue Christmas service is underway. Superior Singers potluck is scheduled for Dec. 18<sup>th</sup> at 4:00. Clothes Closet is in need of some sizes.

Trustees: The roofing company returned to repair leaks. They expect to complete the repairs this week. We will be installing heat tape in areas to reduce winter ice dams. The new shed should be delivered in 2-3 weeks. The outdoor light fixture by the south entry door will need to be replaced.

A motion was made, seconded, and passed to accept the board reports.

**Pastor's Report:** Pastor Carolynn from Pilgrim and Pastor Michelle from Concordia have approached Pastor Sean to discuss possible joint Youth Programs (Confirmation) possibilities. Pilgrim and Concordia do not offer Sunday School at this time and Concordia only has 1 confirmation student. Zion is offering Sunday School, confirmation, and two services at this time. No changes will be made at OSLC at this time.

**New Business:**

Weight Watchers is waiting for corporate headquarters to give them the okay. Discussed the need for a committee to coordinate the serving of bars and beverages at funerals. Diane Erickson is willing with Linda Clark's help. They will do this for members only. The OSLC photo directory is proceeding. Pictures are scheduled for December 9<sup>th</sup> and 10<sup>th</sup>. Diana Garthwait has volunteered to help with calling members.

Brad Nelson requested funding for additional microphones for the sanctuary. After discussion Pastor and Brad will order two hanging microphones. The cost will be approximately \$350, paid by the Kronlund Fund.
