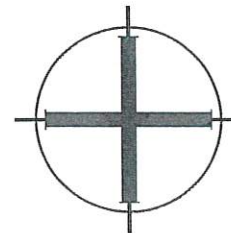

They will go to CASDA and Faith United Methodist Church, which runs two transition housing homes, an apartment building, and provide services for people in need within our community.

"From Worry to Wonder"

A Christmas Message from Bishop Laurie

On June 19, 2020 our granddaughter was born. She was born three months into the pandemic. Her parents were worried. Her grandparents were worried. It is challenging enough to be pregnant and give birth in the best of times but to give birth in the middle of a worldwide pandemic is an even greater worry. We worried about the unknown dangers this virus might present to the mother, the unborn baby, and the new born baby. Our worries kept us up at night. Our worries were relieved when she was finally born, perfect in every way. Our worry gave way to wonder-filled joy. Worry transformed to wonder as we looked back to see how God was holding and carrying them through the unavoidable worry. Our worry transformed to gratitude and wonder watching for what God would be up to next in her tiny life.

It's December 2022. We prepare to celebrate the birth our Lord Jesus. This Advent we come with our fears and worries too. We are living in the midst of challenging times in our country. The very foundation of our nation seems less stable. We each come with our own personal set of worries and fears about our families, health, finances, work, safety, the future...What is it that keeps you up at night? What are you worried about today?

Folks across our church are experiencing doubts and uneasiness about the future of their church. Does it keep you up at night? What are the threats to your church's future? How can the conversation move from fear and worry to wonder? As the miracle of Christ's birth is celebrated this season, we can move from worry to wonder. We wonder what God is up to now in this day and age. Together we wonder what God's will is for the future of our church. Together we wonder; how can we use the abundance and blessings, (what we do have and opportunities in front of us), to make a difference in Jesus' name.

Now in that same region there were shepherds living in the fields, keeping watch over their flock by night. Then an angel of the Lord stood before them, and the glory of the Lord shone around them, and they were terrified. But the angel said to them, "Do not be afraid."

Friends, you are precious, beloved, baptized children of God. We know that the antidote to worry is to trust in God.

During this Advent, Christmas and Epiphany season I pray that your worries will be transformed to wonder at what God is doing and promises to do in your lives and in our churches. May the miracle of Christ's birth transform your worries to wonder! I am grateful for your partnership in ministry.

12-07-22 Isaiah 42:1-9

1. What difference does it make who we identify as the servant?
2. What if we think of it as the nation of Israel currently in exile in Babylon? What if we think of it as Israel, also known as “the people of God”?
3. What if we think of it as Jesus, who Christians understand to be Christ, God’s anointed?
4. Who is “you” in vs. 6-7? What difference does it make to us, specifically, how we answer that question? Does it have any impact on our own relationship with God, or on what we think we ourselves are being asked to do? What impact is that?

Holiday Sprinkle Cookies

2-1/4 cup flour
1/2 tsp. salt
1 tsp baking soda
3/4 cup butter
3/4 cup brown sugar
1/4 cup sugar
1 (3.4 oz) pkg instant vanilla pudding, dry
3/4 cup yellow cake mix, dry
2 eggs
1 tsp. vanilla
1/2 cup red and green sprinkles

Stir together flour salt and baking soda. Set aside. In a large mixing bowl, cream butter and sugars. Add in dry pudding and cake mix. Mix until well blended. Add eggs and vanilla and mix until smooth. Slowly add in flour mixture until mixed well. Mix in sprinkles. Roll in 1" balls. Place on greased or parchment lined baking sheet. Bake at 350 degrees for 10-12 minutes.

Spritz Butter Cookies

1 cup (2 sticks) butter
1 egg
2 tsp almond extract
1/8 tsp salt
2-1/2 cups all purpose flour

Cream butter and sugar. Add extract and egg. Mix thoroughly. Sift dry ingredients together and. Pack dough into cookie press; press shapes onto greased baking sheet.

Bake 400 degrees for 6-8 minutes. Yield 6-7 dozen

Grinch Bark

12 oz white chocolate morsels
12 oz green candy melts
Green M&M's (Holiday Mint works best)
Red Heart sprinkles



Melt the white chocolate and spread in 9X13 pan lined with waxed paper. Let set. May place in fridge for quicker setting but not longer than 10 minutes. Melt green candy melts and spread over white chocolate. Immediately sprinkle with M&M's and heart sprinkles. Let set. Then pick up wax paper with the bark and remove from pan. Peel down the wax paper from both sides. Remove from paper and enjoy.

Tip: If you don't have heart sprinkles, pipe on some red frosting hearts onto each piece,

OSLC Council Minutes – November 15, 2022

Opening Greeting: The meeting was called to order by President Kandee Rosburg at 5:15pm.

Present: Pastor Sean Koos, Kandee Rosburg, Jim Erickson, Kim Erickson, Rick Gilbertson, Dave Kringle, Donna Liebaert, Doris Maki, Stephanie Shaw, Bonnie Wentzel.

Devotions/Prayer: Pastor read from the Book of Micah and shared his thoughts of ways to preach with God's call to do justice in the world. God challenges us about the status quo.

Secretary's Report: A motion was made, seconded, and passed to accept the October 18th council minutes.

Treasurer's Report: Income for October was \$11,363.65. Expenses were \$14,297.30. Expenses included an insurance payment, fire extinguisher and elevator inspections. A motion was made, seconded, and passed to accept the treasurer's report.

Board Reports:

Deacons: The Deacon's budget for 2023 was set. Question about who will put up the Christmas tree.

Stewardship: The Vendor/Craft/Bake Sale will take place December 3rd, from 9am to 3pm. Co-chairs are Linda Clark, Donna Liebaert, and Kandee Rosburg. Len Wicklund will make Pasties.

Board of Education: Their 2023 budget is in. The Sunday School Christmas Program will be December 18th.

Mission & Outreach: December donations – new and gently used clothing for the Children's Clothes Closet. Items needed include new youth socks & underwear, pants, tops, winter jackets & gear, boots & shoes.

Trustees: The new shed was delivered after Jim Erickson and Gene Rosburg added the foundation and ramp. Rick Gilbertson installed the electricity. The roof was repaired and the heat tape is up. The St. Paul's Room windows are leaking. This has been an ongoing problem and is not roof related. A new lease is due for the office copier. The Trustees are working on the 2023 budget. A motion was made, seconded, and passed to accept all board reports.

Pastor's Report: The Sunday School Christmas Program will take place December 18th during the church service. That same day the Superior Singers will be performing at OSLC at 4:00pm with a potluck to follow. They have been rehearsing at OSLC and will give a total of 5 community performances.
