Pastor's Report April 2023

Greetings from your pastor and partner in ministry!!

### 04-12-23 Matthew 28:16-20

1. In v17, Matthew tells us that "some doubted." What do we think this means?

2. How is it possible to "worship" and "doubt" at the same time, or is it?

3. Does the disciples' doubt make them more, or less, like us, do we think? How do we feel about this? Why?

4. What does Jesus' authority have to do with making disciples, do we think?

5. What difference does Jesus' authority make for the work of making disciples?

6. Are "making disciples" and "being witnesses" the same thing? Or different things?

7. In this text, Jesus is speaking directly to his disciples. Are the instructions restricted to these individuals, or do they apply to others? How do we follow these instructions?

8. In v20, Jesus says "remember, I am with you always, to the end of the age." Does this statement apply to the individuals who were there, or more widely?

9. What is included in "everything that I have commanded you"?

10. When we think of Jesus, do we think of him as an authority figure? What difference does it make if we think this way about Jesus?

### 04-19-23 Acts 10:1-17, 34-48

1. Why is this backstory so important? What had Peter learned from his vision which prepares him to meet Cornelius?

2. Now that Peter has the opportunity to tell Cornelius and the others whatever he wants, what does he highlight?

3. What is meant by "peace by Jesus Christ" in verse 36?

4. The Holy Spirit had fallen on believers in Jerusalem (Acts 2) and in Samaria (Acts 8). Now the Holy Spirit has fallen on Gentiles in Caesarea. What is Luke emphasizing with this? 5. How did Jesus want Peter (and now us) to speak of him?

6. What has led to Peter preaching to the Gentiles in this passage?

7. What were some of the reasons the early church was so hesitant to take the Gospel to the Gentiles? Are there similar attitudes in the church today that keep us from taking the Gospel to certain people?

8. What are the implications for us that God shows no partiality? Why is this a good thing?9. How would you explain the good news to someone who hadn't heard it before? Compare and contrast your explanation with Peter's.

10. Why did Cornelius ask Peter to remain with them for some days? What do you think Peter did during that time?

3. Where are these leaders from? What kinds of differences might they have had?

5. How is teaching different from prophecy (1 Timothy 5:17; 4:16; James 3:1; 2 Timothy 2:15)?

Define the gift of teaching.

6. Was Paul using healing to preach the gospel or healing as he preached the gospel (Acts 14:9)? How can you tell? Why does this matter? What was the priority in his ministry (1 Corinthians 2:1-2)?

7. What did Paul "see" in this man? Why is faith essential (Hebrews 11:6; Matthew 9:28-29; Matthew 13:58)?

8. What did this miracle cause them to think about Paul and Barnabas? What can happen when there is a miracle without explanation?

9. What did Paul tell them about his own nature (Acts 14:15)? How is this consistent among the

apostles (Acts 3:12-13; Revelation 19:10)?

10. What does Paul call their idols (1 Samuel 12:21; Psalm 31:6; Jeremiah 10:3-8)? How is God

compared with these idols (Jeremiah 10:10; Isaiah 44:6-9)? What does this God say (Isaiah 45:21-22)?

## SLH COOKS— HOT CROSS BUNS

Hot Cross Buns are a traditional Easter favorite. They are often made on Good Friday.

Ingredients2 packages (1/4 ounce each) active dry yeast

- 2 cups warm whole milk (110° to 115°)
- 2 large eggs, room temperature
- 1/3 cup butter, softened
- 1/4 cup sugar
- 1-1/2 teaspoons salt
- 1 teaspoon ground cinnamon
- 1/4 teaspoon ground allspice
- 6 to 7 cups all-purpose flour
- 1/2 cup dried currants
- 1/2 cup raisins
- 1 large egg yolk
- 2 tablespoons water
- ICING:
- 1-1/2 cups confectioners' sugar
- 4 to 6 teaspoons whole milk

### Directions

**1.** In a small bowl, dissolve yeast in warm milk. In a large bowl, combine eggs, butter, sugar, salt, spices, yeast mixture and 3 cups flour; beat on medium speed until smooth. Stir in currants, raisins and enough remaining flour to form a soft dough (dough will be sticky).

2. Turn onto a floured surface; knead until dough is smooth and elastic, 6-8 minutes. Place in a greased bowl, turning once to grease the top. Cover and let rise in a warm place until doubled, about 1 hour.

**3.** Punch down dough. Turn onto a lightly floured surface; divide and shape into 30 balls. Place 2 in. apart on greased baking sheets. Cover with kitchen towels; let rise in a warm place until doubled, 30-45 minutes. Preheat oven to 375°.

**4.** Using a sharp knife, cut a cross on top of each bun. In a small bowl, whisk egg yolk and water; brush over tops. Bake for 15-20 minutes or until golden brown. Remove from pans to wire racks to cool slightly.

5. For icing, in a small bowl, mix confectioners' sugar and enough milk to reach desired consistency. Pipe a cross on top of each bun. Serve warm.
