*09-04-24 Genesis 2:4b-7, 15-17; 3:1-8*

1. What are the different (but complementary) messages that the two creation narratives communicate?
2. What is the full implication of God being given a name (Lord/Yahweh) in chapter 2? How does this differ from other religions and/or worldviews?
3. The creation of humankind in Genesis 2 is humbling and beautiful. What is the link between Adam and the dust from which he was created?
4. How does humankind differ from other parts of creation? What does it mean to be a living being?
5. If God breathing life into us means that we are able to relate and serve him, how can we do this?
6. Whilst we are given much freedom, it is clear that humankind is also accountable to God. Do you think Christians find it hard to submit to God's authority?
7. What is the expectation of man in the garden? Take some time to explain both responsibilities described in verse 15.
8. How do these verses remind us of the dignity of all work?
9. How can we be on alert against and repel the work of Satan and his planting of doubts and distrust in our hearts? (1 Peter 5:8, Ephesians 6:10-20)
10. How are our relationships with God, one another, and the environment still very much impacted by sin

*09-11-24 Genesis 15:1-6*

1. What is the difference between asking God questions and questioning God?
2. God tells Abram "Fear not, Abram, I am your shield". A shield is a weapon used in war. What would Abram be afraid of and why would Abram need a tool of war?
3. How is this statement to Abram consistent with what God has been promising Abram ever since he told him to leave his country and go to the promised land? (Genesis 12:1-3)
4. What comfort should we be able to take away from Abram's dialogue with God, vs. 2-3?
5. How does God show his love to Abram?
6. How do the two promises God made to Abram compare to the promises we have as Christians?
7. Why does it matter that Abram believes God's promise despite the fact that the promise appears impossible?
8. The Lord appeared to Abram in a vision to remind him of his promises. How does God remind his people of his promises today?
9. What do Abram's concerns about his lack of an heir reveal about his desires and fears?
10. How does God's covenant with Abram influence our understanding of God's faithfulness?

*09-18-24 Genesis 37:3-8, 17b-22, 26-34; 50:15-21*

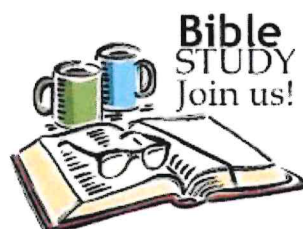
1. What lessons are there for fathers today in Jacob's treatment of Joseph and his brothers?
2. A case might be made that Joseph should have kept his dreams to himself so as not to antagonize his brothers. On the other hand, he recognized it as a dream from God, and the proclamation of God's word always produces animosity. Should Joseph have kept God's revelation to himself for the sake of peace and humility, or did he do well to declare it to his family?
3. Compare Genesis 37:18-20 to James 1:15. How could the brothers have stopped their desire before it led to sin?
4. Why did God choose to reveal to Joseph at an early (and immature) age what he would someday become?
5. Had Joseph not revealed the dream to his brothers (and the resulting activities hadn't occurred), what path might he have taken to the throne that he would later ascend to in Egypt?

6. What's the relationship between the ordinance of the Passover and the ordinance of the Lord's Supper?
7. What does it mean to consecrate? Why did these belong to God?

9. What kind of effect might it have on us if we remember God saving us from our former lives of sin?

The quilters have been busy again this summer. We will have 40 quilts to give to Faith United Methodist Church for their Harbor Houses and Apartments that provide housing for those in need. Come and help us. Anyone is welcome to join us on Mondays from 9 am to 11:30 am or so. Knitters and crocheters are also welcome. It is a great time to get out and socialize with others. During this time, we tie the quilts. Sewing at home. Sewing is done at home and we welcome anyone who wants to sew quilt tops at home (Talk to Kandee about that.). We will also provide you with donated materials we have. Donated materials we can always use. Our biggest need is always the back material for the quilt. Top sheets that are in good condition work great. Any cotton or cotton-blend fabric. We also will use polyester fabric. Other things that work and are in good condition include: drapes, table cloths, shower curtains, etc. Thread Yarn Thank you, Thrivent!!! Through Thrivent Action Teams we purchase batting and fabric for quilt backs. If you have insurance or investments in Thrivent, you are mostly eligible to write for moneys on each account that can be used to purchase materials. # OSLC COOKS

Some yummy cookie recipes for lunch boxes or after school treats!



## Lunch Box Oatmeal Cookies

### Ingredients:

- 1 cup firmly packed brown sugar
- 1/2 cup butter, softened
- 1 large egg
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 1 3/4 uncooked old-fashioned or quick-cooking oats
- 1 cup all-purpose flour
- 1/2 teaspoon baking soda
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1 cup candy-coated chocolate pieces

### Directions:

Combine sugar, butter, egg and vanilla. Beat at medium speed until creamy, scraping bowl often. Add oats, flour, baking soda and salt. Beat at low speed until well mixed. Stir in chocolate pieces. Preheat oven to 375\*. Drop dough by heaping teaspoons, 2 inches apart, onto lightly greased cookie sheets. Bake 9-11 minutes or until edges are lightly browned. Let stand 1 minute on cookie sheets before removing to cooling rack. Alternatives: Stir in 1 cup of *one* of the following ingredients: sweetened dried cranberries, semi-sweet chocolate chips, chopped mixed dried fruit, flaked coconut or chopped pecans. Bake as above.

## Great Chocolate Chip Cookies

### Ingredients:

- |                                     |                             |
|-------------------------------------|-----------------------------|
| 3/4 cup butter flavored shortening  | 3/4 teaspoon baking soda    |
| 1 1/4 cup firmly packed brown sugar | 1 teaspoon salt             |
| 2 tablespoons milk                  | 1 3/4 cup all purpose flour |
| 1 tablespoon real vanilla           | 1 cup chocolate chips       |
| 1 egg                               |                             |

### Directions:

Preheat oven to 375\*. Combine shortening, brown sugar, milk and vanilla. Beat at medium speed of mixer until well blended. Beat in egg. Combine flour, salt and baking soda. Mix into creamed mixture just until blended. Stir in chocolate chips. Drop by teaspoonful about 3 inches apart onto greased cookie sheet. Bake 8-10 minutes for chewy cookies or 11-13 minutes for crisp cookies. Do Not Overbake.. Remove cookies to foil to cool.

## Banana Chocolate Chip Cookies

### Ingredients:

- 1 stick (8 tablespoons) unsalted butter plus more for the baking sheets
- 1 large banana
- 1/2 teaspoon ground cinnamon
- 1 1/4 cups all purpose flour
- 1 teaspoon kosher salt
- 1/2 teaspoon baking powder
- 1/2 teaspoon baking soda
- 1/2 cup packed light brown sugar
- 1/4 cup granulated sugar
- 1 large egg
- 1 teaspoon pure vanilla extract
- 3/4 cup semisweet chocolate chips
- 1/2 cup chopped walnuts, optional

### Directions:

1. Melt the butter over medium heat until foaming. While the butter melts, slice the banana in half across and then in half lengthwise to create 4 long pieces. Once the butter is melted, swirl the skillet and place the banana pieces cut side down in the butter.
2. Saute the bananas, swirling occasionally, until nicely carmelized on the bottom, about 4-6 minutes. Butter can go from browned to burnt in a flash so it's important to stand guard. The butter should smell warm, rich and toasted with a deep golden brown color. When in doubt, pull the skillet from the heat.. It is better to be slightly under toasted. Transfer the bananas and butter to a small bowl and add the cinnamon. Use a fork to mash the bananas.
3. Whisk the flour, salt baking powder and baking soda together. Add the brown and granulated sugars and use the whisk to break up and incorporate the sugars into the flour, Add the egg, vanilla extract and banana mixture and stir with a wooden spoon. Add the chocolate chips and walnuts until just combined.
4. Scrape the dough to the center of the bowl and press plastic wrap directly on the dough. Chill for at least one hour or up to 24 hours.
5. Preheat oven to 350\*. Grease 2 rimmed baking sheets thoroughly with more butter. Scoop dough onto prepared baking sheet, leaving 2 inches between scoops. Bake 12-14 minutes, turning the sheets halfway through, until the edges are golden brown and the centers are puffy and slightly domed. (Centers will settle as they cool.) Cool on the baking sheets 5 minutes before transferring to wire rack to cool completely.





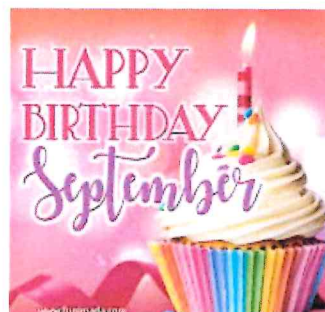
