

The quilters have been busy again this summer. 40 quilts were blessed on September 8th and then given to Faith United Methodist Church for their Harbor Houses and Apartments that provide



housing for those in need. Come and help us. Anyone is welcome to join us on Mondays from 9 am to 11:30 am or so. Knitters and crocheters are also welcome. It is a great time to get out and socialize with others. During this time, we tie the quilts. Sewing is done at home. We welcome anyone who wants to sew quilt tops at home (Talk to Kandee about that.). We will also provide you with donated materials we have.

We can always use donated materials. Our biggest need is always the back material for the quilt. Top sheets that are in good condition work great. Any cotton or cotton-blend fabric. We also will use polyester fabric. Other things that work and are in good condition include: drapes, table cloths, shower curtains, etc. Thread Yarn. Thank you, Thrivent for help with our supplies!!!

Through Thrivent Action Teams we purchase batting and fabric for quilt backs. If you have insurance or investments in Thrivent, you are usually eligible to write for moneys on each account that can be used to purchase materials. This can be worth two (action teams), worth \$250 each, to help pay for projects at church. Talk to Carol Roberts or Kandee Rosburg for more information.



Chicken Tacos

Ingredients;

Breast meat from rotisserie chicken, shredded

1 package of taco seasoning

1 can rotel

10-14 hrd shell tortillas

Shredded cheese

Your favorite taco fixings.

Mix and heat first 3 ingredients through. Stand tortilla shells up in 9x13 pan. Fill with chicken mixture. Top with shredded cheese. Bake at 325* for 10 minutes. Top with you favorite fixings.

Six Layer Hot Dish

Ingredients:

2 medium potatoes, sliced

2 medium carrots, sliced

1/2 cup uncooked rice

2 small onions sliced

1 pound ground beef

1 quart can tomatoes with some liquid.

1 tablespoon brown sugar

Salt and pepper

Grease a 2 quart casserole dish. Layer each of the first six ingredients in the order given, seasoning each layer with salt and pepper. Sprinkle brown sugar over the top. Bake at 300* for 2 1/2—3 hours.

Wild Rice With Pork Chops

Ingredients:

- 1 6 ounce box long grain and wild rice
- 1 can cream of mushroom soup
- 1 1/4 cups water
- 1 16 ounce can Chinese vegetables
- 6 lean pork chops

Black pepper

Directions:

Mix rice, soup and water in a 2 quart casserole. Add vegetables. Arrange pork chops on top. Sprinkle with black pepper. Bake 1 hour and 20 minutes at 350*.

Veal chops or chicken may be substituted for the pork.

Some recipes for Halloween—

Pumpkin Lasagna

Ingredients:

1/2 cup unsalted butter

4 cloves garlic, finely chopped

1 teaspoon dried sage

2 tablespoons pure maple syrup

Kosher salt

1 large egg, beaten

3 cups shredded fontina cheese

1 pound no-boil lasagna noodles

1 onion, chopped

1 teaspoon cider vinegar

3 (15 oz. cans pumpkin puree

2 tablespoons grated fresh nutmeg

freshly ground pepper

1 (15 oz.) container ricotta cheese

3 cups shredded mozzarella cheese

Cooking spray

Directions:

Preheat oven to 375*. In large saucepan over medium heat melt butter. Add onion and garlic and cook, stirring constantly, until fragrant and softened, about 7 minutes. Add vinegar stirring, until mostly evaporated, about 4 minutes. Stir in sage. Add pumpkin, syrup and nutmeg. Season with salt and pepper. Cook, stirring, until warmed through, about 5 minutes. In a medium bowl, stir egg, ricotta and cheese until well combined.

Grease a 13x9 baking dish with cooking spray. Smear a thin layer of pumpkin mixture on the bottom of the dish. Cover with about 1/4 noodles. Top with 1/3 cheese mixture. Spread 1/3 of remaining pumpkin mixture over cheese., followed by a layer of noodles and another layer of cheese. Repeat one more time. Then finish with remaining pumpkin mixture and a layer of noodles. Sprinkle noodles with remaining 1 cup Fontina and 1 cup mozzarella.

Cover dish with foil and bake 35 minutes. Uncover and continue to bake until cheese on top is melted, about 20 minutes more. Let rest 5 minutes before serving.

Brownie Bottom Cheesecake

Ingredients for the brownie:

baking spray 3/4 cup flour

1/4 cup dark cocoa powder 1/2 teaspoon Kosher salt

1/4 teaspoon baking powder 1/2 cup unsalted butter, cut in 1/2 inch pieces

1 3/4 cup semi sweet chocolate chips 3/4 cup granulated sugar

3/4 cup packed light brown sugar 3 large eggs, room temperature

1 teaspoon pure vanilla extract

Ingredients for the cheesecake:

2 8 ounce blocks cream cheese, softened 3/4 cup packed light brown sugar

2 large eggs, room temperature 2/3 cup pure pumpkin puree

2 tablespoons sour cream, room temperature 1 teaspoon pure vanilla extract

1 teaspoon pumpkin pie spice 1/4 teaspoon Kosher salt

Thick caramel sauce and whipped cream for garnish.

Directions:

Preheat oven to 350*. Grease a 9 " springform pan with cooking spray. Whisk the flour, cocoa powder, baking powder and salt until combined. In a large microwave safe bowl, combine the butter and chocolate chips until just about melted, about 1 1/2 minutes. Whisk until smooth, Whisk in the sugars. Add the eggs one at a time, whisking to combine before adding the next. Whisk in the vanilla. Fold in the dry ingredients. Pour into prepared pan and bake until brownie is set and a toothpick comes out clean, about 45 minutes. While the brownie is still warm, use a spoon to press the brownie down into an even crust that comes halfway up the pan. Let cool completely on a wire rack.

While the crust cools, make the cheesecake filling. Preheat oven to 325*. In a large bowl, using a hand mixture, beat cream cheese and sugar until light and fluffy. Add eggs one at a time, mixing well between each addition. Beat in pumpkin puree, sour cream, flour, vanilla, pumpkin pie spice and salt until evenly combined.

Wrap bottom of pan in aluminum foil, then pour cheesecake mixture over brownie crust and place in a deep roasting pan/ Transfer to the oven. Then pour in enough boiling water to come halfway up in the pan. Bake until the center of the cheesecake only slightly jiggles, about 55 minutes. Turn off heat, prop open oven door an let the cheesecake cool in the oven for 1 hour. Then remove foil and refrigerate cheesecake in the pan until firm, at least 5 hours and up to overnight

If desired, drizzle caramel over and dollop outer rim with whipped cream. Sprinkle whipped cream with pumpkin spice.

Halloween Chex Mix

Ingredients:

4 cups Corn Chex 4 cups Wheat Chex

2 cups cinnamon Teddy Grahams 1 cup unsalted butter, melted

6 tablespoons light brown sugar 1 teaspoon ground cinnamon

1 teaspoon kosher salt 1 teaspoon pure vanilla extract

2 cups candy corn and/or candy pumpkins 2 cup chocolate-covered pretzels

2 cups salted sweet potato chips 1 cup Reese's Pieces

Directions:

Preheat oven to 250*. In a large bowl, combine corn chex, wheat chex and teddy grahams. In a small bowl, mix butter, brown sugar, cinnamon, salt and vanilla. Drizzle 1/3 of butter mixture over chex mixture. Toss to coat. Repeat with remaining butter mixture until every component is coated. Divide Chex mixture between 2 unlined, rimmed baking sheets. Spread in an even layer. Bake, tossing every 15 minted, until toasted and crisp, 30-45 minutes. Let cool. Then mix in candy corn, pretzels, sweet potato chips and Reese's pieces.


