

We also will use polyester fabric. Other things that work and are in good condition include: drapes, table cloths, shower curtains, etc. Thread Yarn. Thank you, Thrivent for help with our supplies!!!

Through Thrivent Action Teams we purchase batting and fabric for quilt backs. If you have insurance or investments in Thrivent, you are usually eligible to write for moneys on each account that can be used to purchase materials. OSLC COOKS: Soups



Chicken Dumpling Soup

(This is the soup served for the luncheon at the pie sale. It is from Lynn Hoff.)

Ingredients:

- 1 1/2 2 pound chicken breast (boneless, skinless is fine)
- 12 cups water
- 4 medium carrots, diced
- 4 ribs celery, diced
- !medium onion, chopped
- 1 teaspoon pepper
- 4 tablespoons Better Than Bouillon, chicken flavor
- For dumplings:
- 2 cups flour
- 4 teaspoons baking powder
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 4 tablespoons butter, melted

Directions:

Boil chicken in water with bouillon until cooked through. Remove chicken from broth and cut into small pieces. Return to broth with cut veggies and salt and pepper. Cook 30-40 minutes.

Mix ingredients for dumplings and drop by ~1/2 teaspoons into hot soup. Cover and cook 15-20 minutes.

Bacon Corn Chowder

Ingredients:

6 strips bacon, diced

1 cup milk

1 cup diced celery

1/2 teaspoon seasoned salt

1 small onion diced

1/2 teaspoon salt

1 cup diced, raw potato

1/4 teaspoon garlic powder


1 cup water

1/4 teaspoon pepper

1 (14 3/4 ounce) can cream-style corn

Directions:

In a saucepan, cook the bacon, celery and onionj over medium heat for 10-15 minutes or until th bacon is cooked. Drain. Add the potato and water. Cover and simmer for 20 minutes or until potato is tender. Stir in the corn, milk, seasoned salt, salt, garlic powder and pepper. Heat through but do not boil. May refrigerate or freeze leftovers. Makes 4 servings.



1 32 oz. box chicken broth

1 can cream of chicken soup

8 oz. cream cheese, not fat free


3 oz. bacon bits

1 cup shredded cheddar cheese

Salt and pepper to taste

Put the potatoes in the crockpot. Add chicken broth, cream of chicken soup, half of the bacon bits, salt and pepper. Cook on low for 8 hours or until potatoes are tender.

An hour before serving, cut the cream cheese into small cubes. Place the cubes in the crock pot. Stir occasionally. Once the cream cheese is completely mixed in, it's ready to serve. Top with cheddar cheese and additional bacon bits.



Creamy Chicken Wild Rice Soup

3 T. flour 1/2 C. wild rice

3 C. chicken broth 2 T. butter

1 C cream or milk 3/4 C. onion 2 C. cooked chicken,

1 celery stalk, minced 1 T fresh thyme 1 med. carrot, minced

In med. saucepan bring 2 C of water to boil. Add wild rice. Reduce heat to simmer & cover. Let rice simmer for 40-50 minutes until tender. Drain, set aside. Melt the butter over med high heat in soup pot. Add onions, celery & carrots. Cook stirring occasionally, until the onions are translucent (about 5 minutes). Add the flour & a few grinds of pepper, stir 1 minute. Stir in chicken broth & cream. Cook while stirring until bubbly, then stir for another minute. Add chicken, thyme & wild rice. Serve with good crusty bread!



1 elephant Brown gravy Salt & pepper to taste 2 rabbits

Cut elephant into bite-size pieces (this will take about 4 months). Cook over kerosene at 525° until tender (about 5 months). Add salt and pepper; then cover with This will serve brown gravy. 3,800 people. If more are expected, add 2 rabbits. Do this only if absolutely necessary as most people do not like to find hare in their soup.
