Greetings from your pastor and partner in ministry!!

You all know I like to use this report in December to recap all the fruitful ministry we accomplished together in the prior year...a sort of "Best of 2024" list. I continue to be both pleased and grateful for the fruitful partnership between Concordia and Our Savior's. Both congregations are growing in their own respective ways and each shows great potential for exciting ministry in the year ahead. Concordia's bi-weekly visioning meetings have already borne fruit. The new mission and vision meetings have helped guide our planning. The daycare won't likely get up in running until spring of 2026 but there is plenty of work to be done as preparation (i.e. playground fencing, emergency egress, bookshelves relocation, etc.). We're hoping to revive special music with monthly service performances and a summer/fall music festival. Community dinners and special groups on Sundays are also in the works. Our Savior's continues to provide enriching educational opportunities through faithful Sunday school, confirmation, and Bible studies. Five students were confirmed in the spring and two more are slotted to get confirmed next spring. I'd like to see more participants in all our educational programs though. All in all, I think both congregations are hitting their strides, and the partnership seems to be benefiting each. I hope there is long-term potential for a partnership. Advent Candles

We need readers for the lighting of the Advent candles.

Here are the readings to be used to accompany the lighting of the advent candles:

week 1: Lighting a candle in the darkness helps us find our way. In darkness we lose direction. We cannot see where we have been or where we are going. A single candle, flickering brightly, helps us find our way again. On this first Sunday in Advent, let this light shine brightly as the days grow shorter, so that we will be ready for your face to shine upon us at Christmas. Amen

week 2: Fire burns. It hurts. It can destroy. Fire also gives warmth and light. The coming of Christ is both a day of judgment and a day of promise. Two candles, flickering brightly, help us remember that the coming of Christ has many meanings. We have much to do and we are not sure we will be ready for the day of your coming. In Advent's light, help us to see what is important: to be who you want us to be, and to do what you would have us do. Amen

week 3: The light glowing from our Advent wreath is burning brighter. This radiance warms our hearts and fills us with joy! The Lord has done great things for us. Let us rejoice. We carry many burdens and worry over many things. Help us to hear your promise in this Advent season, that in hearing, we may receive the Spirits' gift of joy. Amen

week 4: Once God's plan was a mystery, hidden from our sight. Now God has disclosed what was kept secret for so very long; he has brought it out in the light. In the brighter light on this fourth Sunday in Advent, may we see more clearly the glory of God in Christ and sing of the steadfast love of the Lord forever. Your faithfulness has been great, leading us to this day of anticipation and celebration. May the glorious light of your steadfast love shine brightly in us and through us, that all may give you praise and glory. Amen

We can do these readings before the announcements are read. The candles are lit right after we sing verses to hymn 240 (1st week= 1 verse, 2nd week=2 verses, 3rd week=3 verses, 4th week=4 verses). Please contact Linda in the office to volunteer.

Through Thrivent Action Teams we purchase batting and fabric for quilt backs. If you have insurance or investments in Thrivent, you are usually eligible to write for moneys on each account that can be used to purchase materials. THE GIFT THAT IS YOU!

2024 Christmas Message



As I reflect on my time in Malawi back in early November, I had so many experiences that ment being shared. As I write this letter, perhaps the most important lesson I can offer was that of my new reality as a guest overseas.

Everywhere I turned, I truly feft like I was the most important person present. Yes, there were times where I was the honored guest as a bishop. I was granted the best seats in the church, in the van, on the stage. When I walked the grounds at the Lutheran Compound in my purple clerical, EVERYONE immediately stopped what they were doing to greet me, even if that was their first encounter with me. I was fed better than most and I never had to carry my own luggage. I had women pour water over my hands

before certain meals (including communion) much like Christ did during the Last Suppor in washing the disciples' feet. And despite my innermost desires to remind them that I was just another guy, I simply could not insult them in that manner. The way in which they treated me was at the core of their faith practice.

Thankfully, Deacen Laura taught me a valuable insight that helped my understanding more clearly. They didn't treat, only bishops that way, they treat all guests that way! Having been to Malawi five times before she took me. Laura has experienced that generous hospitality time and time again. And now that I'm a few weeks removed from their genuine welcome, I still flimity believe that their faith has taught them to tove their neighbor and lift them up no matter how far away we may come.

What if we all treated our neighbor as though they are the most important person present at that time? What if we litted the spirits of the people God places in our lives each and every day? As we prepare for the Christmas story once again this year, we emphasize the gift that comes in the Christ child, God made flesh to live among us mortals. Just think about the lives that the Christ child touched! It started with Mary and Joseph, continued to the shepherds in the fields, and even gave the heavenly host something to praise!

Of course, Jesus wont on to touch so many lives - people in need of healing, children in need of wolcoming, outcasts in need of community, sinners in need of redeeming. Jesus became the gift who holped them all feel that they were the most important person present at the time, people worthy of his unconditional love, people whose spirits were uplifted.

As we march through the season of Advent toward the birth of God Emmanuel, Jesus the savior of the world, remember the gift of God's presence in your lives. Recognize that God is even present within you and that you are a gift as well! And much like my new friends in Malawi, be that gift for others. Reveal Christ's presence to others through your continued faithfulness and dedication to the God of love because that love can overcome division. You are a gift to this synod and to God's church when you let God's light shine in and through you! May this Christmas also reveal to you the light of Christ through others.

OSLC COOKS: Christmas Treats

HOLIDAY SPRINKLE COOKIES

2-1/4 c flour
1/2 tsp salt
1 tsp baking soda
3/4 c butter
3/4 c brown sugar
1/4 c sugar
1 (3.4 oz) pkg instant vanilla pudding, dry
3/4 c of yellow cake mix, dry
2 eggs
1 tsp vanilla
1/2 c red & green sprinkles

Stir together flour, salt and baking soda. Set aside.

In a large mixing bowl, cream butter and sugars.

Add in dry pudding and cake mix. Mix until well blended.

Add eggs and vanilla. Mix until smooth.

Slowly add in flour mixture until mixed well.

Mix in sprinkles.

Scoop or roll 1" balls. Place on greased or parchment

Paper lined baking sheet.

Bake 350 degrees for 10 - 12 minutes.

Makes about 5 dozen cookies.

Heat oven to 325. Mix 1/4 cup crushed candies and 1/4 cup powdered sugar; reserve.

Mix butter, 1/3 cup powdered sugar, 1/4 cup crushed candies, and the vanilla in medium bowl. Stir in flour and salt.

Shape dough by level measuring tablespoonfuls into balls. Place about two inches apart on ungreased cookie sheet.

Bake 12 to 15 minutes or until set but not brown. Immediately remove from cookie sheet; roll in reserved candy mixture. Cool completely on wire rack. Roll in remaining candy mixture again.
