- 4. What was the purpose of the instruction to gather only a day's portion of manna?
- 5. How does the principle of Sabbath rest apply to our fast-paced lives today?
- 6. What challenges does the need to gather daily bread (manna) present, and what do these challenges teach us about trusting God's provision?
- 7. In what ways might God be testing our obedience today?
- 8. How can we cultivate a spirit of contentment and avoid a complaining spirit?
- 9. What parallels can be drawn between the Israelites' spiritual journey in the desert and our own faith journeys?
- 10. What does it mean for Jesus to be the "Bread of Life," and how does that concept relate to manna and our daily needs?



- Any cotton or cotton-blend fabric.

- Drapes, table cloths, shower curtains that are in good condition also work well.

- Yarn

Thank you Thrivent!!!

Through Thrivent Action Teams the quilters are able to purchase batting and fabric for quilt backs. If you have insurance or investments in Thrivent, you are most likely eligible to write for moneys on each account that can be used to purchase materials, which can be worth two (action teams). 

The Board meeting started at 5:20 and opened with our Mission Statement, a devotion from Genesis and prayer.

Secretary's Report: Approved as written in the board reports. Motion to approve the minutes, second and passed (M/S/P).

Treasurer's Report: Bonnie reported an income of \$ 7,853,36 and expenses of \$11,040.37 for a loss of \$3,187.01 for the month.

Board Reports:

Board of Education

Reviewed expectations for the Confirmation Students, including acolyte duties, Reading the first Sunday of the month and Bible Camp.

Fund raisers for youth camp. Discussed a number of possibilities including spaghetti dinner, car wash cards, and pizza sales.

Discussed a chili fundraiser the Sunday before the Super Bowl Sunday School is going well so far, it is starting after the service is finished. The front middle, unbolted door is left open and will be locked by the last teacher to leave.

Deacons

Len is the Deacon for October.

The Sunday Breaking Chains service will be inside because of unpredictable weather.

Mission and Outreach -

Barb delivered items collected for Faith United Methodist Food Pantry in August. We are collecting for the Salvation Army Thanksgiving Baskets in September and October.

We received a Thrivent card from one of our members and Thrivent to help with items for the Threads of Hope Clothes Closet and were able to purchase 74 items for boys and 25 items for girls. We are currently switching from Spring/Summer items to Fall/Winter items. The reorganization should be completed in October.

The Threads of Hope Clothes Closet provided 99 items in August to our clothes closet visitors.

Threads of Hope business cards were recently discovered. Dianne and Carol will post them on bulletin boards around Superior.

Stewardship is down to 3 members.

Created the pledge drive letters. Kandee will get the Pledge Drive cards ready.

Creating a list of things that can be done around the church. Will make sign up sheets for each of the items so our church family can sign up for things they are interested in.

Checking other options for receiving offerings through text, Vanco, etc.

Trustees – Report as written.

Old Business:

Insurance is due again. Costs have increased significantly due to the increase of claims. Switching from Acuity to Fremont. Our deductible will go up significantly for some items.

Stain glass repair and cleaning – proposals from \$12,000 - \$20,561. Decision not to proceed with the repairs at this time due to budget constraints.

Parking lot light repair and upgrade – the light fixtures are here and will be installed in the next 2 weeks.

Phone system was discussed and tabled.

New Business:

An interested party approached the church to lease space for a day care. The trustees discussed a wide range of concern including rent revenues, increased utility expenses, space requirements, fence needs, capitol improvements, impact on insurance or tax-exempt status, etc. Also discussed how bringing young families to the church for daycare may lead to new members. The trustees recommend the Council set up a committee to study the feasibility of renting space to a day care provider.

We have used Badger for snow plowing for years. They have sold the business. Rick is reviewing our options. We will add Concordia to the plowing discussion.

M/S/P to accept the board reports.

Pastors Report:

We will be setting up for the Breaking Chains service on Saturday. It was switched from a barbeque to hot dishes because of weather unpredictability.

Each church will give \$100.00. Ben and Taylor will donate the rest.

A new member class will be held on October 5th after the service with new members being inducted the following Sunday.
