Pastor's Report February 2026

Greetings from your pastor and partner in ministry!!

Sure, there will be challenges that arise but they don't have to be stumbling blocks for us. We can adapt and grow along the way. 10. How can we fall into the trap of focusing on religious rules rather than the heart of God's love and mission?

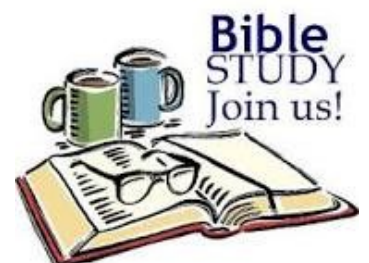

7. What does the expulsion from the synagogue (v. 34) teach about the cost of discipleship?
8. Why were the Pharisees so determined to deny the miracle (vv. 18, 22, 29)? What does their interrogation reveal about their hearts?
9. How does the man's parents' fear compare to our own willingness to stand for our faith?
10. What can we learn from the blind man's bold testimony ("One thing I know...") when facing critics?

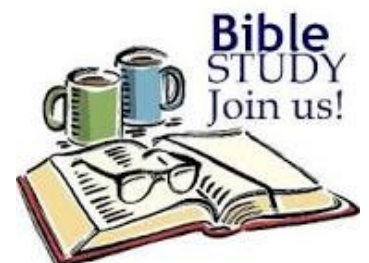

3. What did Jesus mean by "this sickness will not end in death, but is for the glory of God" (v. 4)?
4. How did Martha's initial words (v. 21) show both faith and a lack of full understanding?
5. Compare Martha's and Mary's responses (vv. 20-22 vs. 32). Who did they blame?
6. When Jesus asked, "Do you believe this?" (v. 26), what was Martha truly being asked to believe beyond future resurrection?
7. What does Jesus' statement, "I am the resurrection and the life" (v. 25), reveal about his power over death?
8. Why did Jesus weep (vv. 33-35)?
9. How does this miracle serve as a sign pointing to Jesus as the Messiah?
10. How does believing Jesus is the "resurrection and the life" change our perspective?

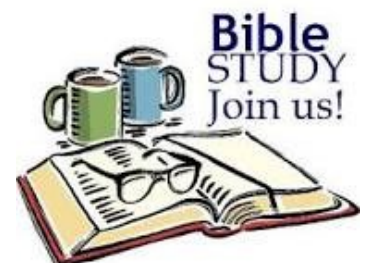

The Board meeting started at 5:20 and opened with our Mission Statement and prayer.

Secretary's Report: as written in the board reports. Motion to approve the minutes, second and passed (M/S/P).

Treasurer's Report: Income was \$12,940.15 and expenditure were \$13,715.30, for a loss of \$775.15 in December and a total shortage of \$11,188.12 for 2025. On a good note, we were \$32,483.88 under the projected budget. Motion made to approve the treasurer's report (M/S/P)

Board Reports:

Board of Education

The Christmas program went well for those who could attend. Sunday School attendance is down overall due to illness.

Parents need to come into the church to pick up their Sunday School children to prevent any issues.

The confirmand mentoring program met for the second time last Sunday.

The raffled basket raised \$100. It was suggested to give the money to a local charity. Motion made to give the money to Second Harvest food shelf. (M/S/P)

Help is needed for the Superbowl Chili Feed, including chili cooks, servers, and crews for set up and clean up. We also need volunteers to make deserts (cookies, bars, etc.) and corn bread. Linda will send out notices and there is a sign-up sheet on the table in front of the St. Paul's room.

You will be able to purchase Chili to take home or eat in.

Suggest all boards/committees give Pasto Koos current information to update the Church webpage.

Deacons

Len took down the Christmas tree.

Discussed Lent services (Ash Wednesday on Feb. 18th)

Talked about Soup supper sign-up.

Prayed for the members of our congregation.

Mission and Outreach

Reviewed their updated job description and approved the minor changes.

The board is unsure about where the expense reported in the annual report came from. The board has a zero budget, so it is unclear where they spent the \$76.75 listed. Dianne will talk to Linda about it.

The Children's Clothes Closet gave out 109 items in December.

Cheri will deliver collected items for Highland Wellness and Restoration.

In February we will be collecting for the Zion Food shelf. (Reminder – this is a contest between the ELCA Lutheran Churches in Superior and we would like to hold the trophy for 2026.)

Waiting until next month to decide where to make monetary donations from the first Sunday collections.

Stewardship

Met, completed our annual report.

Prepared the giving statements for 2025.

Filled hand sanitizer bottles and replaces bottles. Need to order more hand sanitizer and Velcro.

Trustees – Report as written.

Old Business:

The December treasurer's report was reviewed.

Approved the 2026 Draft Budget. It will include a 3% salary increase.

The budget increased 1.7% over 2025 actual expenses.

New Business:

Computer Update (office) from Windows 10 to Windows 11 concern. Microsoft stopped supporting Windows 10 this and our office computer needs to be updated. The committee suggested a new office computer is needed along with a review of data storage backup.

Audit Committee Review of the 2025 Financial Documents was scheduled for January 16th.

The Trustees annual report was reviewed and approved.

M/S/P to accept the board reports.

Pastors Report:

The ELCA churches are getting together for a joint worship on February 15th at 10am. Bishop Martin Halom will be attending. Potluck information will be coming out soon.

Pastor moved his vacation to February 27th – March 2nd.

Vision Victories:

Holiday services.

Giving stayed consistent.

Lighting was great for the Christmas Eve service.

Ongoing Business:

The board is unsure about where the expense reported in the annual report Discussion about the bathrooms in the fellowship hall. We need to get quotes for new toilets so we can plan to replace them. Tabled for next month for Donna to review.

Discussion held with the unrest with Ice in Minneapolis. Jeff discussed several stories he heard.

There is a pastor who is an Ice agent. Protesters went into a church to protest and disrupt the service.

There are reports of ICE going into churches and arresting people.

He attended a church where anti-trans messages from the pulpit.

He has talked to friends that state they do not go to church because they do not feel safe due to their sexual orientation.

This raises the question of what type of message should we have as a church?

We as a church need to be more conscious and generate more dialog about social justice issues. Think about how to have dialog about these types of issues.
